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JOINT MEMORIAL SERVICE

On Sunday afternoon at 4:00 PM, May 4, 2014, a Joint Memorial Service was held in the Grand Chapter Building, at 811 Mulberry Street, Macon, Georgia. Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Clyde E. Griffin, lit the red candle, Most Illustrious Grand Master, F. Andrew Lane, Jr. lit the Purple Candle, and Right Eminent Grand Commander C. Danny Wofford lit the white candle. A hearty welcome was extended to all participants to the Annual Joint York Rite Ceremony of Remembrance for all deceased Companions and Sir Knights. Grand Chaplain Greely R. Graves, Jr., and Grand Prelate Rev. Donald C. Combs conducted the services. The following Grand Officers and Past Grand Officers were remembered as follows:

RICHARD S. SAGAR, MOST EXCELLENT GRAND HIGH PRIEST 1974 JUNE 16, 1916 - DECEMBER 11, 2013

I rise this afternoon to answer the roll call for one of the "sons of light" who can no longer answer for himself on this the Terrestrial plane. Most Excellent Companion Richard Saville Sagar, PGHP, has escaped the surly bonds of earth and ascended into that Celestial Sphere from who's borne no traveler returns. It is most appropriate that we memorialize his life in this brief ceremony of remembrance.

I want to say at the outset that this memorial is not mine alone. I was assisted in great measure by Most Excellent Companion Joe E. Turner, PGHP, who did a yeoman's job of research to secure the names, titles, and dates of the events marking the life of Most Excellent Companion Sagar.

Born in London, England, on June 16, 1916, Most Excellent Companion Sagar was one of five children. Completing his education in private schools, Most Excellent Companion Sagar was employed by a British firm in Southeast Asia in 1936, where he worked until the outbreak of World War II. Initially, he became a soldier in the Indian Army, and for a time was a prisoner of the Japanese. Escaping from the Japanese in most ordinary fashion, he trekked through Indonesia and ended-up in Australia. There, he became a member of the Royal Australian Air Force and served as Master Navigator/Radio Specialist for the rest of the war, with the rank of Chief Warrant Officer. Granted a Commission shortly before the end of the war, he was reassigned to the British Army in June 1945 for special services with the rank of Captain.

Most Excellent Companion Sagar married Eileen Simpkin from Adelaide, South Australia in 1945 and, at the time of his passing, the couple was in their 68th year of marriage. To this marriage were born two sons, Jerrold Sagar, who passed away several years ago, and Christopher Sagar, who survives. Leaving Malaysia in 1955, the Sagar family arrived in the United States the following year, where he worked in overseas engineering sales, with major overseas travel. Transferring to the Atlanta area in 1960, the Sagars lived in a number of locations, but for the past couple of decades have lived in Acworth. Retiring from his main business in 1981, after a cardiac attack and open-heart surgery, he went on to serve as building manager of the Atlanta Masonic Center until 2001. He then served as librarian of the Atlanta Masonic Library and curator of the Atlanta Masonic Museum. During this period, his sight began to deteriorate, and in 2004, he was declared legally blind. He retired as librarian and curator.

Initiated in Elliott Lodge No. 3557 EC in 1948, he was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on May 14, 1949 and served as Worshipful Master in 1953. He was appointed District Grand Steward in 1954 for the District of Eastern Archipelago, covering Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand and Borneo. He was to join several English and Scottish Lodges while still a resident in Melaka and Singapore, but resigned from them when he became a resident in the State of Georgia, owing to the restriction on multiple memberships...a restriction that is no longer in force.

Upon arriving in Atlanta, Most Excellent Companion Sagar joined Tucker Lodge No. 42. Over the years he was a member of a number of different lodges in the Greater Atlanta area. At the time of his demise, he was a member of Cartersville Lodge No. 63 and James E. Sledge Daylight Lodge No. 742. Elected an Honorary Member of the Grand Lodge of Georgia in the early 1970's, he later served as Worshipful Master of Buckhead Lodge No. 712 in 1976 and thus became a member in actuality.

Most Excellent Companion Sagar served as a member of Grand Lodge Educational and Historical Commission for several years. In the course of his Masonic life, he received the Grand Lodge Award as a 50-year Mason, and from Cartersville Lodge as a 60 year Mason. He was also recognized as a 50 year Past Worshipful Master.

A Charter Member of Georgia Lodge of Research and its two predecessor research lodges, Most Excellent Companion Sagar served as Master in 1972 and 1988. He was elected a Fellow in 1989. He delivered the Walter M. Callaway Lecture in 1991, and he was made an Emeritus Member in 2008. He was a member or honorary member at various times of several USA Lodges and other Masonic organizations.

ROYAL ARCH

Exalted in Dalhousie Chapter No. 508 EC in 1949, Most Excellent Companion Sagar became a founder and charter secretary of St. Andrew Chapter No. 748 SC; 1950. Upon his immigration to the United States, he affiliated with Sweetwater Chapter No. 49 at Luxomni, Georgia on February 27, 1962. He served as High Priest of Sweetwater Chapter No. 49 in 1964. Demitting from Sweetwater Chapter No. 49 in 1968, he affiliated with Mt. Carmel Chapter No. 98. He served as Most Excellent Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons for the State of Georgia in 1974. Georgia then had 125 Royal Arch Chapters with approximately 24,000 members. Mt. Carmel Chapter No. 98 changed its name in April 1976 to Panthersville Chapter No. 98.

Most Excellent Companion Sagar demitted from Panthersville No. 98 in 1988 and affiliated with Mt. Zion Chapter No. 16. He affiliated with Sweetwater Chapter No. 49 in 2004, as a dual member and was its oldest member. In 2007, he demitted from Mt. Zion No. 16 and affiliated with Cartersville Chapter No. 144. Most Excellent Companion Sagar served as the chairman of the Educational Committee of General Grand Chapter of R.A.M. International for 12 years. He was consecrated in the Council of Anointed High Priests in 1965; served some years as Chaplain until inducted as President in 1980. He received his Royal Arch Mason 50-year Award in 1999.

MARK MASONRY

Mark Masonry is somewhat different under the English Constitution than it is in the United States. Companion Sagar was advanced in Edaljee Khory Mark Master Lodge No. 436 EC. He was advanced in Mayhew Royal Ark Mariner Lodge No. 436 EC. He was a founder and Charter Commander Noah of North Atlanta Royal Ark Mariner Lodge No. 313 GA in 1994 (part of Allied Masonic Degrees).

CRYPTIC MASONRY

Most Excellent Companion Sagar was greeted in Ailsa Cryptic Council and Ailsa Lodge and Council No. 602 SC in 1951. Upon arriving in Georgia, he joined DeKalb Council No. 21 and served as Illustrious Master in 1965. He would be its oldest member if DeKalb Council were still in existence. He became a charter member of Panthersville Council #76 on April 21, 1976. He demitted to Jason Burr Council #13 in 1985 and demitted from Jason Burr #13 and affiliated with Minor C. Shadburn Council #49 in 2007.

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR

Most Excellent Companion Sagar was knighted in Golden Chersonese Preceptory and Priory No. 290 EC. In the United States, he joined DeKalb Commandery No. 38 KT and served as Eminent Commander in 1965, and at the time of his death was their oldest Past Commander.

KNIGHTS OF YORK CROSS OF HONOUR

Having served as the presiding officer of all four of his York Rite bodies, Lodge, Chapter, Council and Commandery, Most Excellent Companion Sagar was admitted to Cherokee Rose Priory No. 56, Knights of the York Cross of Honor in 1966. He served as Eminent Prior in 1975 and received the Knight York Grand Cross of Honor.

ANCIENT AND ACCEPTED SCOTTISH RITE

Most Excellent Companion Sagar became a member of the Valley of Atlanta, Orient of Georgia, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry in 1964. He served as Venerable Master in 1984. He received the Knight Commander Court of Honour in 1973 and was coroneted 33rd Degree and Inspector General Honorary in 1979. He served for some years on the 33rd Degree Team.

RED CROSS OF CONSTANTINE

Most Excellent Companion Sagar was invited to join St. Ambrose Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine, in Atlanta in 1970. He served as Puissant Sovereign in 1984 and, afterwards, as Recorder for ten years.

SHRINE

Most Excellent Companion Sager joined Yaarab Temple, Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine in 1963. He served as a member of the Director's Staff from 1966 through 1968. He was a charter member of the Past Masters unit (the Knights of Mecca) as well as Past President and wrote the ritual for them. He resigned from Shrine in 2003.

YORK RITE COLLEGE

Initiated in Governor General's College in Washington, DC in 1972, Most Excellent Companion Sagar was a founding member and Charter Secretary of Luther G. Palmer College in Atlanta. He became an Emeritus member.

ALLIED MASONIC DEGREES**

Initiated in George Potts Council in Richmond, Va. in 1972, Most Excellent Companion Sagar became a founder and first Commander Noah and Sovereign Master of North Atlanta Council No. 313.

SOCIETAS ROSICRUCIANA IN CIVITATIBUS FOEDERATIS

Most Excellent Companion Sagar was a founder of the Atlanta College of Societas Rosicruciana In Civitatibus Foederatis and was appointed Chief Adept for Life. He served as such for several years with rank of IXth Grade.

HOLY ROYAL ARCH KNIGHT TEMPLAR PRIEST

Most Excellent Companion Sagar was a founder and the Charter Very Eminent Preceptor of Fidelitas Tabernacle No. LXXVII. He was a recipient of the Knight Grand Cross.

MISCELLANEOUS OTHER MASONIC BODIES

Among the other masonically related bodies in which Most Excellent Companion Sagar was active were the Royal Order of Scotland and the Grand College of Rites. Additionally he was a founder and Charter Excellent Chief of "Carl F. Lester" College of Knight Masons (recently written up nationally as the oldest member in age and service in the United States), listed in "Who's Who In American Freemasonry" and "Who's Who in Georgia Freemasonry". He was a Fellow of the Philalethes Society (largest Masonic Research Society in USA).

MAJOR WRITINGS

Most Excellent Companion Sagar's first effort at writing for a Masonic purpose was in 1954/55, when he reorganized "The Pentagram", the Year Book of The District Grand Lodge of The Eastern Archipelago EC and including data on the District Grand Lodge of The Middle East. This was all done on an old manual typewriter. For over 20 years he was the editor of, and main contributor to, the monthly Georgia Supplement in the national "Knight Templar Magazine" and the York Rite Supplement in the "Masonic Messenger." He wrote a number of Papers for the Georgia Lodge of Research, many of which were presented verbally. In the 42 years of that Lodge and its predecessors, he was Editor of its "Transactions" for at least 15 years. He was the last remaining Charter Member of the original Research Lodge in Atlanta having become a member in 1967.

AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS

Among his accolades, Most Excellent Companion Sagar received the following: The Grand Lodge of Georgia "Literary Achievement" Award, the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International's "Bronze Medal" in 1965 and the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International's Silver Medal in 1986. He is only one of three Royal Arch Masons to have ever received "both" medals! In 2002 he was appointed General Grand Librarian for three years by the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International, with particular reference to cataloging and displaying the "Ray V. Denslow Masonic Library" which is now in the care of the Atlanta Masonic Library. Most Excellent Brother Denslow was probably the best-qualified Masonic scholar in the United States during the 20th century, as well as a personal friend of President Harry Truman, himself a Past Grand Master of Missouri.

During the course of his duties as General Grand Librarian, Most Excellent Companion Sagar became aware of a great controversy that existed in the mid-1950's between two great Masonic giants...John Henry Cowles, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Southern Jurisdiction, and Most Excellent Companion Ray V. Denslow, General Grand High Priest of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons. Owing to his failing eyesight, Companion Sagar was unable to complete the research and asked me to undertake the project. With his guidance and supervision, the paper "Less than Fraternal" was completed after two years of detailed research. Companion Sagar was singularly responsible for me traveling to London to present that paper before Quaturo Coronati Research Lodge No. 2076. I will be eternally grateful to him for that opportunity.

In 2005, Most Excellent Companion Sagar was presented the "Dewey H. Wollstein" Award by the Grand Lodge of Georgia, its highest award. Named for an outstanding Georgia Past Grand Master and Masonic Scholar, it is given no more frequently than once every five years. He was only the seventh person ever to receive it.

SUMMARY

Much has been said and will be said about Most Excellent Companion Richard Saville Sagar, but suffice it to say that he was a forthright individual. He was never reticent in expressing his opinions or putting forth his arguments for or against an issue.

It might be argued that Most Excellent Companion Sagar was a cosmopolitan man. He was equally at home in Malaysia or in South Georgia. He was comfortable in his own skin, and that is a goal for which we all can strive. For over 60 years Bro. Sagar was deeply involved in his Freemasonry, sometimes more than reasonably so. In all that time he always received major support from his wife Eileen, who he would occasionally refer to as "Bessie." He was deeply grateful for her support for all those years, and we are deeply grateful that she shared him with us.

OSWALD H. KING, JR. MOST ILLUSTRIOUS GRAND MASTER 1975 August 21, 1921 – June 21, 2013

I rise to answer for one who can no longer respond to an earthly roll call. Most Illustrious Companion O. H. King, Jr was born August 21, 1921. A son of the late O. H. King, Sr and Nina Brown King as one of seven children in Early County, Blakely, Georgia. Companion King was educated in the public schools of Georgia and Jacksonville, Florida, as well as the University of Georgia. Companion O. H. and Sara Pipkin were united in marriage on March 23, 1941. To this union were added three children, two (2) daughters and one (1) son and at the time he was serving as Most Illustrious Grand Master there were seven (7) grandchildren. Most Illustrious Companion King was reared on a farm and pursued farming as his chosen profession, in Early County where he resided for all of his adult life. Companion King served the craft for more than sixty-eight (68) years, having been raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Magnolia Lodge No. 86 on October 9, 1944. He furthered his Masonic journey by being exalted in Blakely Chapter No. 44, Royal Arch Masons on November 16, 1944 and greeted in Blakely Council No. 39, Royal and Select Masters on November 17, 1944. He was knighted in Trinity Commandery No. 39, Knights Templar on April 6, 1965. On November 17, 1948 he received the degrees of the Order of the Eastern Star in Blakely Chapter No. 282. Our companion served as presiding officer of the four (4) York Rite Bodies and as Worthy Patron of Blakely Chapter OES. Companion King was also a member of Hasan Temple of the Shrine and Georgia Priory No. 39 Knight York of the Cross of Honor. In addition to serving his local Masonic bodies Companion King also served as District Grand Deputy of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch. Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, and while serving as Most Illustrious Grand Master he served as District Deputy to the Grand Master for the Third Masonic District. Most

Illustrious Companion King was elected to the station of Most Illustrious Grand Master at the Annual Assembly of Grand Council in April 1975 and presided over the Annual Assembly in April 1976. His year of service was performed with distinction to the craft and honor to himself. During his year as Most Illustrious Grand Master he traveled extensively within and without the state. He represented the Grand Council at the Annual Assembly of three out of state Grand Jurisdictions as well as the Triennium General Grand Council Assembly in Cleveland, Ohio. As a personal note it was my privilege to attend the Grand Council Assembly in April 1976 where I represented Tara Council No. 75 as Illustrious Master. Also I received the Order of the Silver Trowel which was beautifully dramatized by Most Excellent Companion Charlie Murphy occupying the station of King David. Companion King, a devoted Christian and believer in Christ as Savior and having passed through the final veil, we trust entered into eternal joy on June 21, 2013. May God richly bless his family and friends he left here on Planet Earth.

THOMAS R. GAINES, MOST ILLUSTRIOUS GRAND MASTER 1991 APRIL 21, 1924 — AUGUST 18, 2013

When one is called upon to answer the roll call, for a Brother, Companion, or Sir Knight it does not have the sadness that one experiences when the person is a Friend. M. I. Grand Master Gaines opened many Masonic doors for Masons, so you can understand the sadness and sorrow that we feel at this time.

PERSONAL HISTORY

Thomas Raymond Gaines was born in Marion County near Tazewell, Georgia. He attended schools in the Sumter County School System, graduating from Plains High School in 1941. One of his Class Mates was Former President, Jimmy Carter, in which they had their Fifty Year High School Reunion at the White House. He Attended an NYA Vocational School in College Park, Georgia. He served as a Civil Service worker in the Norfolk Ship Yard at Portsmouth, Virginia from 1942 to 1944. He served in the U. S, Navy from 1944 to 1946. Companion Gaines farmed and Worked as a mechanic from 1946 to 1950. He entered Civil Service at Robins Air Force Base in 1951 and retired in 1982. He married Martha Autry of Americus in 1950 and they have one daughter, Sharon and two sons, Terence and Paul. They also have one granddaughter, Katie and two Grandsons, Aubrey and Austin. Tommy loved Baseball and played for many years.

He and his sons made a trip to Coopers Town to see the Baseball Hall of Fame Hq. He was a member of the Northview United Methodist Church in Warner Robins, Georgia. He served as fifth Sunday school teacher for several years, having visited Shut-ins and patients at the hospital.

MASONIC RECORD

He was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Tyrian Lodge No. 111 of Warner Robins, Georgia on April 3, 1956. He served as Worshipful Master of Tyrian Lodge in 1965. He was very involved with Youth Groups including both Rainbows for Girls and the DeMolay for Boys. He served the Grand Lodge as 12TH District Custodian of the Uniform Work from 1972 to 2013. This was Forty-

One Years as Custodian. He was made an Honorary Member of the 7th Masonic District Convention. He also served the Grand Lodge as Grand Tyler 1981-1982. He was a member of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley of Macon, he was decorated as a Knight Commander Court of Honor and was coroneted a 33rd Degree Inspector (Honorary) in the Scottish Rite Masonry. He was a member and Past Patron of Martha Berry Chapter No. 351 Order of the Eastern Star. He was exalted as a Royal Arch Mason in Constantine Chapter No. 4 on May 8, 1976, serving as High Priest in 1984. He was greeted as a Royal and Select Master on May 8, 1976 in Washington Council No. 6, serving as Illustrious Master in 1985. He was knighted as a Knights Templar in St. Omer Commandery No. 2 on May 8, 1976, serving as Eminent Commander in 1987-1988. He received the Order of High Priesthood on April 16, 1984, and the Order of the Silver Towel on April 15, 1985. He was a Past Sovereign of New Covenant Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine, a Member of Luther G. Palmer York Rite College No. 123 of Atlanta, a member of Georgia Priory No. 39 Knights of the York Cross of Honour. He was constituted a Noble of the Mystic Shrine in Al Sihah Temple in Macon on August 19, 1981. He was a member of the Ritualistic

Brother Tommy we will miss you but never forget you because we will always say that's the way Brother Tommy taught us.

Cast. He was a dedicated Mason and promoted the principles of Freemasonry to

a high Degree of proficiency.

JOSEPH E. LOWRY, MOST ILLUSTRIOUS GRAND MASTER 1992 November 29, 1928 – February 25, 2014

I rise to answer the roll call for MIC Joseph Eugene "Gene" Lowry, who served Cryptic Masonry as Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Georgia for the year 1992-93. Gene Lowry was born in Gwinnett County, Georgia, on November 29, 1928, to Joseph G. and Ada Robinson Lowry. He attended public schools in Gwinnett County and graduated from Lawrenceville High School. After briefly attending North Georgia College in Dahlonega, he served his country faithfully and well during the Second World War in the United States Marine Corps. Upon his Honorable Discharge from the Marines, he attended the University of Georgia at Athens. Comp. Lowry worked in the paint business for The Glidden Company and IC Paint Company and, after twenty-five years, retired in 1991. In civic life, he was a Past Commandant of the Old Guard of the Gate City Guard of Atlanta and served for several years as Civil Affairs Officer for the Georgia State Defense Forces. Comp. Lowry also volunteered for several years with the Gwinnett Juvenile Court as a Court-Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) for disadvantaged children. Our honored companion was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason in Lawrenceville Lodge No. 131 on April 15, 1980, and served his lodge as Worshipful Master for the year 1986, after which he was museum curator and librarian for the lodge for many years. He later served the Craft as President of the Atlanta Masonic Temple Company and Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of South Carolina near the Grand Lodge of Georgia. Gene Lowry was constantly seeking further light in Masonry. He joined

the Scottish Rite in the Valley of Atlanta in 1980, was invested with the rank and decoration of Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in 1985 and coroneted an Inspector General Honorary (33°) in 1991. Comp. Lowry worked hard in the Scottish Rite, as he did in all other aspects of the Craft, serving as Director of the Robing Room and Director of Scottish Rite Associations, as well as Degree Master for the 28th and 32nd Degrees. In other appendant bodies, Companion Gene was a member of Yaarab Shrine, the Royal Order of Jesters, Khorassan Grotto, National Sojourners and Heroes of '76. A Charter Member of Georgia State Forest No. 181, Tall Cedars of Lebanon, he served as Grand Tall Cedar in 1985 and was named Grand Tall Cedar of the Year by the Supreme Forest for his exemplary work in that role. He was later made District Deputy Supreme Tall Cedar and labored in that capacity from 1986 to 1990. It was arguably in the York Rite, however, that our Illustrious Companion's Masonic light shined particularly brightly. Having been exalted in 1980, he served Mt. Zion Chapter No. 16, RAM, as High Preist in 1988. Also in 1980, he was greeted as a Select Master by Jason Burr Council No. 13, R. & S.M., where he was Illustrious Master in 1985. Being knighted in the same year he joined the other York Rite bodies, he served as Commander of Atlanta Commandery No. 9 in 1990-91. He received the Chair degrees in each body and served through the line in the Order of the Silver Trowel. As to the invitational Bodies appendant to the York Rite, he was a member of Cherokee Rose Priory No. 56, KYCH; Luther G. Palmer York Rite College No. 123; and member and Past Eminent Preceptor in his Tabernacle of Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests. As previously mentioned, MIC Lowry served as Grand Master of the Grand Council of Georgia in 1992-93. In everything he did. Comp. Lowry was the epitome of excellence and dedication. He departed this life to join the Supreme Architect in the Celestial Sanctuary above on February 25, 2014, leaving behind his wife Sarah and two sons and their families. He will be missed by all of us.

February 2, 1942 – July 25, 2013

Companion Newton married the love of his life the former Sandra McCoy. The couple resided in Cumming Ga. where they raised one daughter, Mrs. Dee Rauscher. Newton was preceded in death by his parents, Newton B. & Aileen True Copelan.

Newton proudly served in the US Navy where he received his GED. He was an active and vital member of Shady Grove Baptist Church in Cumming, GA. He proudly participated in many Masonic Bodies and began his Masonic career on January 21, 1975, being raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Lafayette Lodge #44. He was Worshipful Master in 1983, served as Treasurer for 24 years, and 9th District Convention Worshipful Master from 2002 to 2003. He was a Charter Member of Charity Daylight Lodge #754, served as District Deputy to the Grand Master from 1985 to 2009.

Companion Newton served as Excellent High Priest of Silver Shoals Chapter #14 in 1979. He also served as Excellent High Priest of the 9th district Royal Arch

Due to his failing health he resigned his position in the Grand Line of the Grand Council. In 2012, he was elected Most Illustrious Grand Master Honorary of the Grand Council Royal and Select Masters for the State of Georgia.

Companion Newton served as Eminent Commander of Amicalola Commandery #41 in 1988, and served as Prelate from 1989 to 2009. He also became a member of the Grand Commander's Club in 1998. In 1975 Newton became a member of the Scottish Rite Valley of Atlanta Orient of Georgia. He received the Knight Commander Court of Honor and the high honor and rank of 33rd degree. He received the Double Eagle Award and worked for many years on the Stage Crew. Newton was a member of Cherokee Rose Priory #56 Knights of the York Cross of Honor, Luther G. Palmer York Rite College #123, and Carl F. Lester, Jr. Council #65 Knight Masons. He was a Charter Member of Cherokee Council #439 Allied Masonic Degrees, and served as Sovereign Master of Dave H Keever Council #365 AMD in 2004. He received the Red Branch of ERI and the Bath Degrees. He was also a member of the Royal Order of Scotland, and charter member of the Georgia Highland Association Royal Order of Scotland. Companion Newton was a member of Yaarab Shriners A.A.O.N.M.S. of Atlanta, Georgia. In 1994, he was President of the Cumming Shrine Club, he was also a member of Cumming Chapter #346 — Order of the Eastern Star, where he served as Worthy Patron 6 times and was District Grand Deputy from 2002 to 2003. He was a member of Clan #6 Highlander, Clan #11 - Grand and Glorious Order of the Hillbilly Degree, life member of Yellow Dog Degree in Tennessee, and Atlanta Court #91 Royal Order of Jesters.

Companion Newton's life was one of great love for his family and friends, dedication to his church, unselfish service to other brethren in the order and humanity. During his lifetime "Skeets" made numerous friends and touched many lives. His sense of humor and smile will be greatly missed by all who knew him. Though we miss him greatly we are comforted in the belief that Companion Newton heard those words which are stated in the Bible. "Well done thy good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things; I will make the ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord."



CLYDE E. GRIFFIN – BIOGRAPHY

PERSONAL

Born October 1, 1945 to Charles and Eunice Griffin in Statesboro, Georgia, Clyde was educated in the public schools of Chatham County and furthered his education at Armstrong State College and ICS earning his degree in Business Management. He served his country in the U.S. Army and Georgia National Guard. In 1966, Clyde and the former Judy Zipperer were united in marriage and have maintained a happy and supportive relationship ever since. They are members of Isle of Hope United Methodist Church where Clyde serves as a Sunday School Teacher, Usher Team Captain, UMM Officer and has served in different capacities on the Administrative Council.

Clyde began his vocational career in 1964 as he started work with Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company as a Frame man. Future job progressions resulted in promotion to management in 1978. Clyde held many different positions during his thirty-six year span, retiring in 1999 as Project Manager for Lucent Technologies, formerly AT&T, and never missing a day of work due to illness in all those thirty-six years.

Active in community, church and Masonic affairs, Clyde serves on numerous committees, councils and local organizational programs in and around the Savannah area. He is a 46 year member of American Legion Post No. 184 and a 51 year member of the First Volunteer Regiment of Georgia. Clyde served on the Advisory Board for Candler General Hospital for five years and was an active representative for United Way for 16 years. He has supported the Salvation Army over the last 15 years by coordinating the Volunteer Bell Ringing Program with the Masonic groups in Savannah. Most days during the week, Clyde can be found at the Scottish Rite office in Savannah where he serves as General Secretary. His love for the outdoors finds him often on the golf course or out on the waterways in pursuit of his favorite food. Clyde also has a sideline business in his home, a trophy and engraving shop which keeps him busy when he has nothing else to do.

MASONIC

Raised as Master Mason in Thunderbolt Lodge No. 693 on October 24, 1972, Clyde served as Worshipful Master in 1978 and as District Master in 1989. Appointed to the Grand Lodge Line also in 1989, Clyde was elected and installed to the highest honor in Masonry, that of Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons, at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Georgia in October of 1995. He went on to serve as Master of Solomon's Lodge No. I in 1999 and presently serves as Treasurer of Coastal Daylight Lodge No. 750 and is also a member of Bryan Lodge No. 303. Clyde has served as the first District Director of Leadership Development in the First Masonic District, on the Trial Commission and as the Grand Representative to Oklahoma. He has served on the Grand Lodge Endowment Fund Committee, Publications Committee, Masonic Home Board of Trustees, Youth Council, Appeals and Grievances Committee, Finance Committee and is presently serving on the General Welfare Committee as well as Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee and Code Supplement Committee. He has also served for three years as a member of the Board of Directors of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. As a member of four Blue Lodges and an honorary member of numerous in-state Lodges and four out-ofstate Lodges, Clyde is extremely popular in Masonic circles and frequently called upon for Masonic funerals and installations, as well as speaking engagements at many and various Lodge functions.

Receiving all the York Rite Degrees and Orders in 1973, Clyde presided as High Priest of both Georgia Chapter No. 3 and the First District Royal Arch Convention, twice as Illustrious Master of Georgia Council No. 2 R&SM and as Eminent Commander of Palestine Commandery No. 7, KT, as well as Prior of Georgia Priory No. 39, KYCH. He has now served through all York Rite Grand Lines:

Most Illustrious Grand Master of Royal & Select Masters in Georgia 1987; Most Excellent Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons in Georgia 2014; Right Eminent Grand Commander of Knights Templar in Georgia 2004; Most Worshipful Grand Master of Free and Accepted Masons in Georgia 1996. KYGCH (Past Prior) with 4 Quadrants.

Clyde has served on the Finance Committee of both the Grand Chapter and Grand Council and as Chairman of Jurisprudence of both Grand Bodies. He is a recipient of General Grand Chapter Ritual Award. He is also serving as Grand Representative of the Grand Chapter of RAM of Montana, Grand Representative of the Grand Council of R&SM of Texas and Grand Representative of the Grand Commandery of KT of Idaho. He presently serves as Chairman of the Knights Templar Education Foundation for the Grand Commandery of Georgia.

Transferring his membership from Palmetto York Rite College No. 79 in South Carolina, Griffin became a charter member of Luther G. Palmer York Rite College No. 123 in Atlanta and was instrumental in the formation of Herman E. Freeman York Rite College No. 186 in Savannah, serving as its first Governor. Clyde also served as Grand Governor in Georgia and is a holder of the Purple Cross as well as an Associate Regent in the York Rite Sovereign College of North America. He is Past Sovereign and Past Recorder of Oglethorpe Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine and currently serves as Intendant General - Georgia Southern. He is a Past Preceptor of Upper Room Tabernacle No. XLV, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priest.

Griffin joined the Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley of Savannah in 1978 and has served as Venerable Master of the Lodge of Perfection, Wise Master of the Chapter Rose Croix and on the Executive Committee for twenty years before assuming the position of General Secretary. The Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction, AASR, elected him to receive the rank and decoration of Knight Commander Court of Honor in 1985 and he was coroneted 33° Inspector General Honorary in 1991. He is presently in his thirteenth year as General Secretary for the Valley of Savannah.

Named by Alee Shriners as the "Shriner of the Year" in 1991, Noble Griffin has also served as President of the Mobile Unit, Ritualistic Divan, Knights of Mecca and Southeastern Ritual Cast Association where he also served as Secretary for the last ten years of that organization's existence. Clyde continues to perform with the Ritualistic Divan in the first section of every ceremonial alternating as the Potentate or Chief Rabban. He is also a member and current Tragedian of Savannah Court No. 134, Royal Order of Jesters.

A Charter member and Past Sovereign and present Secretary of both Georgia Council No. 304 and Savannah Council No. 328, Allied Masonic Degrees, Griffin is also a Charter member and holds the VII Grade in Georgia College of the Masonic Societal Rosicruciana in Civitatibus Foederatis and is a member of South Carolina Council No. 20 Knight Masons and the Royal Order of Scotland. He is a member/officer of the Order of St. Thomas of Acon; 4° member Great Priory of America, CBCS. He is a Past President of Hunter Chapter No. 502 National Sojourners and Past Commander of Georgia Hussars Camp Heroes of '76.

Clyde has served and continues to serve on the Advisory Council of Cecil Cheves Chapter, Order of DeMolay and as a member of the DeMolay Foundation of Georgia, and has received the DeMolay Honorary Legion of Honor Award and the Cross of Honor. Clyde has also served on the Advisory Panel of the Savannah Assembly No. 1, Order of Rainbow for Girls and is a recipient of the Grand Cross of Color Award.

Clyde served as President of the Order of High Priesthood in 2002 and as Thrice Illustrious Master of the Order of the Silver Trowel in 1990 and as Knight Crusader of the East in 2004. He continues to work in each Order when called upon.

Projected Per Capita to be collected is \$71,278. Projected 2014-2015 Budget is \$78,965 (Same as the 2013-2014 Budget). All Chapters, with the exception of Columbian Chapter No. 136 have paid their Per Capita Tax.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1) That each Chapter re-write their By-Laws, using the adopted STANDARD FORMAT, and submit them to this Office for approval and placement in the Grand Chapter archives.
- 2) That each York Rite Mason actively assist their Chapter Officers in stemming the NPD hemorrhaging and bring those who have departed via NPD back into the fold.

REPORT OF CHARTER & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Grand Officers, and Members of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Georgia: Your committee on Charters and By-Laws wishes to make the following report: We recommend the approval of the complete revisions of the By-Laws of Mount Zion Chapter No. 16, R. A. M.; Toccoa Chapter No.21, R. A. M.; Lakewood Chapter No.27, R. A. M.; Newnan Chapter No.34, R. A. M.; Statesboro Chapter No.59, R. A. M.; Kellogg Chapter No.61, R. A. M.; Covington Chapter No.71, R. A. M.; Winder Chapter No.84, R. A. M.; and Smyrna Chapter No.160, R. A. M. We recommend the approval of the complete revision of the By-Laws of Rome Chapter No.26, R. A. M. with the following changes: Amend the second paragraph in Article I, Section 1.3 to comply with the Grand Chapter Code regarding vacancies in office. Section 2.10.1.3. Amend the second sentence in Article II, Section 2.1 to read: "He must be a Master Mason for at least six months or have stood examination on the Master Mason's catechism, and is in good standing in a Lodge recognized by the Grand Lodge of Georgia, Free and Accepted Masons." Your Committee is confused by Article III, Section 3.3. Certain members may be exempt from per capita tax under Grand Chapter Code. Does this section mean that all members including emeritus, etc. now pay dues? Notified 4-3

We recommend the approval of the complete revision of the By-Laws of Alpharetta Chapter No.162, R. A. M. with the following exception. Article III, Section 5 as written. The Committee assumes that the Inaugural High Priest,

King, and Scribe of the chapter are deceased. Please redefine who are the trustees if actually needed, and when they are elected or appointed and for how long. Notified 4-1

Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Pythagoras Chapter No. 10, R.A.M.; Fayetteville Chapter No.72, R.A. M.; Austell Chapter No. 87 R.A.M.; West Point Chapter No.89, R.A. M.; and Valdosta Chapter No.107, R.A. M.; and Genesis Chapter No. 166, R.A.M. changing the annual dues.

Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Y. A. Wright Chapter No.122, R.A. M. changing the annual dues and fees charged for degrees.

Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Sweetwater Chapter No.49, R.A. M. changing the annual dues and fees charged for degrees with the following change: Amend Article VI, Section 3, Arrears, to change the word "one" to "two", so that the sentence shall read in part, "arrears with his dues two full years"...as per Grand Chapter Code Section 2.10.5.2. Notified 4-2

Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Cherokee Chapter No.13, R.A. M. changing the fees charged for degrees.

Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Pickens Chapter No.28, R.A. M. changing the annual dues and fees charged for degrees and also amending the amount the Charity Committee may spend.

Your Committee has before it a revision of the bylaws of The Fourth District Royal Arch Masonic Convention changing the Annual Convocation to the third Saturday in June each year. While the Committee will approve the By-Laws as submitted, your Committee believes that Section IX which requires an incoming High Priest to be present and installed is unduly restrictive. The incoming High Priest may have served faithfully for 7 or 8 years and suddenly finds himself in the hospital or under a doctor's care and unable to attend the meeting and forfeits his time to serve as High Priest.

Your Committee also has before it a revision of the bylaws of The Sixth District Royal Arch Masonic Convention changing the location from Griffin to a place to be decided each year at the convention and your Committee approves this amendment.

Your Committee notes that Hapeville Chapter No. 97 was consolidated with Forest Park Chapter No. 75 on October 1, 2013, and Edward S. Nix Chapter No. 112 was consolidated with Smyrna Chapter No. 160 on December 31, 2013.

Your Committee again calls to the attention of the Grand Chapter that Columbian chapter No.136 in Washington, Georgia, with a membership of 41, has filed no returns nor paid any per capita tax in several years and has not met in several years. The committee believes that Companion Walter McCannon, Jr. and others have tried to revive the members into meeting, but have encountered no success or desire to meet. REPORT OF THE ROYAL ARCH RESEARCH ASSISTANCE COMMITTEE

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Past Grand High Priest, Grand Line Officers, Distinguished Guest, and Companions All. Your committee on Royal Arch Research Assistance makes the following report for the year of 2013/2014. I would like to thank MEGHP Clyde E. Griffin for appointing me as chairman of this committee and giving me the opportunity to work with such hard working and devoted companions as EGCH William F. (Bill) Shepard and EGPS Craig A. Haggas. These Companions have done an excellent job throughout the state in spreading the news of the General Grand Chapter search for the best place for our charitable contributions. In the Eastern Region, which consists of 21 Grand Chapters, we are ranked #2 behind Fl. and \$179,445.62 ahead of 3rd place South Carolina. We are ranked #6 in the nation.

With the new power point program we now have, and present at each RAC convention, it has resulted in great success. The Companions are now able to see exactly where and how our money is being used. University of Connecticut and Dr. Musiek receive a grant of \$60,000.00; Hearing Health Foundation receives \$100,000.00 for 4 grants of \$25,000.00 to 4 well deserving students for further research and \$100,000.00 to Autism Speaks. All of these are working on Central Auditory Processing Disorder which applies to all three of the Grants. We tried something this year by challenging each RAC to beat what the previous convention gave. We had a lot of fun with it. The highest giver was the 9th with a donation of \$1757.00 and the next one to them was the 7th with a donation of \$820.00. We still have the 8th district which will come after this report. I will add their amount to the total we now have at the convention. So far we have taken in a total for RARA of \$5,508.00 at the conventions. I have volunteered to the incoming High Priest Michael H. Wilson to be Chairman again and he said no problem. The challenge next year is to beat what you gave last year. I have the amt. and will let you know prior to your convention so you can be prepared to top it. I would also like to encourage each man active in the chapters to save your pennies. If each man would save a penny a day that would be \$3.65 he could

give to his secretary of his chapter in December to go towards their chapters 100% for the year of 2014. I save all my pennies and have around \$12.00 now and by December should be around \$20.00 or more. I would like to see each chapter in the State be 100%. A dollar per man is not too much to ask. That has been the amount for several years and it should be raised to at least \$3.00. I had hoped to have a list of the Chapters that were 100% in December and what Chapters had given to add to this report but was unable to get that information so I am not sure of what our total giving was from May 2013 to May 2014. I will try to have that information for you in 2015 for 2014-2015. Whatever you gave thanks from the bottom of my heart even though you are not recognized in this report. I also went thru the 2013 Preliminary Committee and financial reports and could find no where listed how much we gave to RARA 2012-13. I will not be able to compare last year's giving with this year. I realize that budgets and personal income has been tough on everyone and money seems tighter now than in the past. Companions you went above and beyond the call of duty to make this one of the best years in RARA in a long time. The Committee once again wants to give you a "BIG THANKS". 

F. ANDREW LANE, JR - PERSONAL

F. Andrew "Drew" Lane, Jr. was born August 13, 1962, in Atlanta, Georgia, to Fred A. Lane, Sr. and Jeanette Black Lane. He was educated in the Atlanta Public School System and graduated from Northside High School in 1980. Lane received the degree of Associate in Arts from Oxford College of Emory University in 1982 and earned the Bachelor of Arts degree with a double major in Political Science and History in 1984 at Emory University in Atlanta. After a short time in the news business at a small newspaper and then a radio station in Haralson County, Georgia, Lane moved to Macon to attend Walter F. George School of Law of Mercer University, where he was awarded the Juris Doctor degree in 1988. Upon graduation from law school, Comp. Lane joined a small Dallas, Georgia, law firm as an Associate Attorney in general practice with concentrations in real estate and criminal and civil litigation. He served as President of the Paulding County Bar Association in 1990. In 1992, he hung out his own shingle as a solo general practitioner continuing to work primarily as a litigator in criminal and civil matters. In 1995, he joined the prosecutorial community as an Assistant District Attorney for the Tallapoosa Judicial Circuit. It was in 2005 that he was appointed by the Governor to fill an unexpired term as District Attorney for the Paulding Judicial Circuit of the State of Georgia, and he was elected to a full term in 2006. After the expiration of that term, he was appointed Director of Fraud Investigations for the Georgia Department of Insurance, where he served for more than two years before returning to the private practice of law in Dallas. In civic life, Comp. Lane has been a member of the Paulding County and Camp Big Heart Civitan Clubs, serving as President of the Paulding County Club in 1990-91 and Governor of Civitan Georgia District North in 1993-94. As a Civitan, Lane, along with a Rotary Representative and a community member, served for 11 years on the Steering Committee for the Annual Christmas Parade in Dallas, Georgia. In 1994, he was elected Council member from Ward 3 of the City of Dallas and served in that capacity for 11 years. Comp. Lane began his Masonic journey in Tallapoosa, Georgia, where he was raised a Master Mason in Tallapoosa Lodge No. 126 in 1985 and served as Worshipful Master in 1988. He is now a member and Past Master of Dallas Lodge No. 182 and Draketown Lodge No. 252 and is a Charter Member of Paulding County Daylight Lodge No. 759. At various times, he has served as Director of Work at Dallas and Draketown Lodges and continues to hold an Orange Card in the Seventh Masonic District. In 2008-09, he was Master of the Paulding County Masonic Convention and in 2012-13 served the Seventh District Masonic Convention as Worshipful Master. He continues to be active in Blue Lodge degree work, especially as a member of the Dallas Fellowcraft Club. Companion Lane has served the Grand Lodge in several capacities, including District Deputy to the Grand Master for Sub-District 7-E (2000-08) and Chairman of the Trial Commission for the Seventh District (2001-2005). He is currently Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Georgia. Comp. Drew joined the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry in 1986 in the Valley of Macon. Since affiliating with the Valley of Atlanta in 2001, he has been active in the work, filling roles in the 7th and 30th Degrees. He received the rank and decoration of Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in 2003 and served as Preceptor of the Atlanta Council of Kadosh in 2013-14. Lane has been a member of Yaarab Shrine and the Paulding County Shrine Club since 2001. Comp. Lane has been an active York Rite Mason for more than 12 years, having joined Dallas Chapter

No. 142, R.A.M.; Douglasville Council No. 37, R. & S.M.; and Douglasville Commandery No. 40, K.T. in 2001. Since that time, he has affiliated also with Douglasville Chapter No. 50 and Western Council No. 29 and has served as Presiding Officer for each of the above-named constituent York Rite bodies. Drew is an active participant in York Rite degree and order conferrals, particularly in the Cryptic degrees. He has also served as High Priest of the Seventh District Royal Arch Convention and Illustrious Master of the Seventh District Council Convention. Lane is an officer in the Order of the Silver Trowel and at the time of this Grand Assembly serves the Order of High Priesthood as Ex. President of the Georgia Council of Anointed High Priests. Comp. Drew is a member of the Georgia Highlands Association of the Royal Order of Scotland, as well as Luther G. Palmer York Rite College No. 123. He is a member and officer of St. Ambrose Conclave, RCC; Georgia Council No. 304, AMD; and Upper Room Tabernacle No. XLV, HRAKTP. In addition, he is a member and officer of Cherokee Rose Priory No. 56, KYCH, where he also has filled various roles in the cast of the degree of Super Excellent Master. Comp. Lane is a member of First United Methodist Church in Dallas, Georgia. He and his wife Margie live in Dallas with their "children" – four dogs and three cats.

To the Grand Council Officers, Most Illustrious Past Grand Masters, General Grand Council Representatives, Distinguished In-State and Out-Of-State Guests and Companions All:

It is my distinct honor and pleasure to welcome you to the One Hundred Eighty-Eighth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Georgia. If any of the Grand Council Officers or I can make your attendance more pleasant or be of any assistance to you, I hope that you will not hesitate to let us know.

OUT-OF STATE AND IN-STATE VISITATION

During the past year, I have had the pleasure of representing the Grand Council of Georgia at the Southeastern York Rite Conference in Tampa, Florida; the York Rite Grand Sessions of the Grand Jurisdiction of Alabama in Huntsville. Alabama; the York Rite Grand Sessions of Florida in Tampa; and the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Alabama in Birmingham. (Although I was scheduled to attend York Rite Grand Sessions in South Carolina and North Carolina, an unexpected death in the family did not permit.) REPORT OF CHARTER & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

To the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Grand Officers, and Members of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Georgia: Your committee on Charters and By-Laws wishes to make the following report: We recommend the approval of the complete revisions of the By-Laws of Lakewood Council No.10, R. S. M.; Jason Burr Council No. 13, R. S. M.; E. L. McConnell Council No.40, R. S. M.; Covington Council No. 41, R.S.M.; Statesboro Council No.46,; R. S. M; Piedmont Council No.56, R. S. M.; Smyrna Council No.60, R. S. M.; Hiram Council No.62, R. S. M.; and Winder Council No.77, R.S.M.

We recommend the approval of the complete revision of the By-Laws of Rome Council No.15, R. S. M with the following changes: Amend the second paragraph in Article I, Section 1.3 to comply with the Grand Council Code regarding vacancies in office. Section 2.8.1.3; 2.8.3.2; 2.8.3.3

Amend the second sentence in Article 11, Section 2.1 to read: "He must be a Master Mason for at least six months or have stood examination on the Master Mason's catechism, and is in good standing in a Lodge recognized by the Grand Lodge of Georgia, Free and Accepted Masons, and a Royal Arch Mason in good standing in a Chapter recognized by the Grand Chapter of Georgia, Royal Arch Masons.' Also the next to last sentence in the second paragraph of Article II, section 2.1 should read ".... Petition cannot again be received until after a period of 6 months....." See sections 2.9.1 and 2.10.2 and 2.10.7 of the Council Code. Also amend Article IV Section 4.1, Paragraph, to read as follows: "Should a member of this Council be suspended or expelled from his Masonic Lodge or Royal Arch Chapter, said suspension or expulsion shall immediately be recognized by Rome Council No. 15, Royal and Select Masters.

Your Committee is confused by Article III, Section 3.3. Certain members may be exempt from per capita tax under Grand Council Code. Does this section mean

that all members including emeritus, etc. now pay dues? Notified 4-3 We recommend the approval of the complete revision of the By-Laws of Alpharetta Council No.54, R. S. M. with the following exceptions. Article II, Section 1 as written. The second sentence should read "... must be of the degree of Royal Arch Mason..." Also the next to last sentence should read ".... Petition cannot again be received until after a period of 6 months....." See sections 2.9.1 and 2.10.2 and 2.10.7 of the Council Code. Notified 4-3 - Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Griffin Council No. 8 R.S.M.; Austell Council No. 47 R.S.M. and Fayetteville Council No.66, R.S.M.; changing the annual dues. Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of A. H. Goodin Council No.28, R.S.M. changing the annual dues and fees charged for degrees. Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Gwinnett Council No.44, R.S.M. changing the annual dues and fees charged for degrees with the following changes: Amend Article VI, Section 2, Dues to change the last

sentence to read "Dues shall become payable in advance on January 1 each year". Grand Council Code Sections 2.8.6.2.2. Amend Article VI, Section 3, Arrears, to comply with Grand Council Code Sections 2.8.6.2.2; 2.8.6.2.3; and 2.8.6.2.4, regarding non-payment of dues, notices required and suspension. Your Committee also calls attention to Article I, Section 2 in noting the correct name of General Grand Council is "General Grand Council of Cryptic Masons, International instead of as written. Notified 4-4

Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Marietta Council No.74, R.S.M. changing the fees charged for degrees. Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Pickens Council No.55, R.S.M. changing the annual dues and fees charged for degrees and also amending the amount the Charity Committee may spend. Your Committee has before it a revision of the bylaws of the Midwest Georgia District Council Convention and your Committee approves these By-Laws as submitted. This committee notes that Covenant Council U.D. in Warner Robins which has been under dispensation since March 19, 2012 is applying for a charter. REPORT OF THE CRYPTIC MASONS MEDICAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION

To: The Officer and Companion of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Georgia The committee is happy to report the following information on the CMMRF.

Roudebush VA Medical Center, Indianapolis is the highest rated health care provider in the country. Diabetic Retinopathy-(Retinal blood vessel damage of the eye) this is leaking blood vessels that can cause irreversible vision loss. However Dr. March and his team are working on Fat-derived stem cells that may be able to stabilize the blood vessels in both diabetes and macular degeneration. Many trials conducted take such a long time to get the word out that's why the VA is so helpful in conducting the studies. They assist in the recruitment, provide equipment, and educate, to name a few. The goal is to become the leading outreach system in the country. However this type of research still needs lots of funding to be successful.

Dr. Murphy's team holds the national leadership position in stem cell research for peripheral disease, they have FDA approval for Bone Marrow derived stem cells, this is in phase one and hope for fat derived stem cells from blood vessels in fat. PVD (Peripheral Vascular Disease) poor blood supply from unhealthy blood vessels can result in amputations. Clinical trials are under way using adult bone marrow stem cells with remarkable results. Peripheral Arterial Occlusive Disease is a type of vascular disease that is similar to atherosclerosis that occurs in peripheral blood vessels in the legs. Over 18 million are affected with this disease. The reduced blood flow in the legs may have a range of symptoms from pain when walking to Critical Limb Ischemia (CLI), many will develop blisters or ulcers because of the reduced blood flow. A bypass procedure called Angioplasty in the leg which takes a vein from the other leg may be on option for treatment or

a stent may be an option, however it could be too late for these treatments and your only option is to amputate the limb. 30% of CLI patients cannot have by pass, the outlook on a patient with CLI is similar to a patient with terminal cancer. 30,000 to 50,000 with CLI die each year after having a limb amputated. Treatments using adult stem cells from bone marrow is safe, a recent study Dr. Murphy conducted consisted of 29 enrolled patients, (30 legs) 22 composed of a 12 week study, 3 dropped out for alternate reasons ,2 deaths occurred and 3 amputations which occurred at day 2 and day 5. One patient had complications with chest pain; the formula was changed by 2 cups decreased bone marrow. Within 4 weeks of the stem cell injections 15% had improvement in the toes, at 8 weeks 10% had improvement in the ankles. Decrease in overall pain was at 12%. The quality of life for these patients was improved significantly after stem cell injections, stem cells are as good as bypass or angioplasty. The study confirms after one year survival rate was at 68% for those who had surgery (amputation), 71% for those who had angioplasty and 86% for those who had stem cell replacement therapy. Stem cell therapy is safe and helps prevent amputation.

Irina Petrache, M.D.; Vascular Biology and Medicine, spoke on Adipose Stem Cell Therapy for Lung Disease. Originally from Romania Dr. Petrache now in the states and an American for 20 years, works with a variety of diseases. Dr. Petrache works very closely with emphysema and COPD. COPD-chronic obstructive pulmonary disease is a lung disease induced usually by cigarette smoking and characterized by emphysema and/or chronic bronchitis. This is the 4th leading cause of death in the country. It is the permanent destroying of air spaces in the lung. When a person loses one half of the lungs capacity to take in air that's when symptoms appear. Dr. Petrache's study consist of smoking mice, mice are put in a chamber to receive cigarette smoke, like humans they get very addicted (FAST). When scientist leave for the weekend and the mice have to take a break the mice get very angry and hostile to one another. This is a 4 month experiment, 4 months to expose them to the smoke and 2 months to inject the mice with the Adipose; this is the Adult stem cell that is derived from fat tissue. The Adipose is injected intravenously in the blood stream. The adipose Stromal cell is injected this way because the blood flows through the body and into the lungs where the hope is they will attach themselves and start creating new cells in the lung, this is called lung homing by the vein. After 21 days the study showed to have cells in the lung, the cells are found by washing out the lungs and then checking for cells. Mice that got stem cell treatment maintained their weight and

the ones that didn't get stem cells lost weight. The ones with adipose stem cell treatment recovered adequately.

The average research cost for a study runs \$20,000 to \$30,000 per adult for each Phase Trial. Normally a minimum of 30 Adults are needed to perform one Trial. The cost for a trial is \$1Million. Keep this in mind when giving companions. This is a list of the Diseases where there is hope for Stem Cell Treatment:

- 1. Heart Disease
- 2. Diabetes
- 3. Blindness
- 4. COPD/Lung Disease
- 5. Regenerative Medicine
- 6. Peripheral Artery and Vascular Disease
- 7. Wound Healing
- 8. Erectile Dysfunction
- 9. Hemophilia Arthritis



They extended their best wishes for the Grand Commandery to have a most successful Conclave.

ADDRESS OF THE RIGHT EMINENT GRAND COMMANDER

To the Officers, Past Grand Commanders, Sir Knights and Distinguished Guests of the Grand Commandery of Georgia, Knights Templar.

It is with pleasure and honor that I welcome each of you to our One Hundred and Fifty Fourth Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Georgia, Knights Templar. We hope that your visit to the beautiful city of Macon and to this session proves to be an enjoyable, comfortable and memorable experience. A special welcome is extended to our Southeastern Department Commander, Right Eminent Sir Knight Ted Burgess. Thank you for taking time out of your busy schedule to be with us and for all that you do for Templary. As most of you may know, Freemasonry has been a large part of my life for forty-two years. I began my Masonic life at the age of twenty-six receiving a Petition for the Degrees of Masonry from Past Grand Commander W. Joe Clarke. By virtue of his example and mentoring my involvement in the Fraternity grew and almost immediately I became a member of the Chapter, Council and Commandery. Over the years I have had so many wonderful opportunities to serve in the Masonic Order. To have had the privilege to know so many outstanding men and their families all over our great State has been a most rewarding and fulfilling experience; to have served as your Grand Commander has been indeed the "capstone" of my journey in the York Rite. I can only pray that my service has met your expectations and merited the trust you placed in me last May.

STATE OF THE ORDER

While we experience most of the problems that other Grand Commanderies across the United States are confronted with, I am uplifted in sprit by the efforts of a number of our Commanderies here in Georgia. To the Right Eminent Grand Commander, Officers, and Sir Knights of the Grand Commandery of Georgia:

The Grand Commandery of Georgia charged this Committee with the responsibility of Investing and administering the funds of the Grand Encampment's Knights Templar Educational Foundation, Division of Georgia, and our solely owned Corporations, The Knights Templar Educational Foundation of Georgia, Inc. and the Mollie S. Moseley Eye Foundation Trust of Georgia, Inc. The Division funds, which are mandated to be administered in accordance with the Grand Encampment's Rules and Regulations, permitted the committee to award five-\$1000 scholarships, from interest earned this year, to deserving undergraduate students. REPORT OF THE CHARTERS AND DISPENSATIONS COMMITTEE

To the Right Eminent Grand Commander, Grand Officers, and Members of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Georgia:

Your committee on Charters and Dispensations wishes to make the following report:

We recommend the approval of the complete revisions of the By-Laws of Atlanta Commandery No. 9, K.T., Tancred Commandery No. 11, K.T., Alexius Commandery No.22, K.T. and Arnold de Troye Commandery No. 31, K.T. Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of Griffin Commandery No.35, K.T. changing the annual dues. We recommend the approval of the complete revision of the By-Laws of Rome Commandery No.8, K.T. Your Committee notes that the By-Laws provide for a stated Conclave on the 2nd Thursday of each month and also on Good Friday each year. Your Committee approves this section. Additionally, your Committee is confused by Article VIII Section 8.1, which provides for suspension for non-payment of dues, but the Commandery itself does not charge dues. Amend Article IX, Section 9.2.5, to allow a member to purchase his own uniform from any vendor. Neither the Commandery nor the By-Laws can require its members to purchase a uniform through the Commandery. The Commandery may provide assistance from the Uniform and Equipment account if funds are available. .Notified 4-7 Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of St. Bernard Commandery No.25, K.T. changing the annual dues and fees charged for degrees.

Your Committee is in receipt of a complete revision of the By-Laws of Philemon Commandery No. 33, K.T. Your Committee notes that the By-Laws provide for a stated Conclave on the 4th Tuesday of each month including December. Your Committee approves this but wonders, will the Commandery actually meet on December 24, and December 25 when those dates occur. Additionally, your Committee is confused by Article IX Section 1, which provides for suspension for non-payment of dues, but the Commandery itself does not charge dues. Lastly, Article VI, Section 1, says that the fees for the orders shall be set by vote of the Commandery. The Standard By-Laws require a fee be stated, or the By-Laws may reflect that the Fee for the Orders may be voted on at the Annual Conclave or some other stated meeting each year. Notified 4-7

Your Committee approves the amendment to the bylaws of DeKalb Commandery No.38, K.T. changing the annual dues and recommends approval of changing the meeting date from the 4th Monday to the 4th Thursday, except June, July, October and December. The Grand Commander has issued Dispensation #11 for this change.

They are not in conflict with the Constitution, Statutes and Regulations of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the USA or of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Georgia. We recommend their approval. We have reviewed the various bills and resolutions submitted for consideration at this Grand Conclave. We find all the Bills to be not in conflict with the Constitution, Statutes and Regulations of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the USA or of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Georgia and in proper form to be considered by this Grand Commandery. We have reviewed the proposed complete revision of the Constitution, Statutes, and Regulations being presented by the Statues Revision Committee. We approve of this revision in toto and recommend its adoption. We have reviewed the Joint Resolution concerning the schedule of the Annual Convocation of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of the State of Georgia, the Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Georgia, and the Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Georgia. We commend the sentiment expressed so that all Grand Bodies will be equitably and appropriately attended. GENERAL ORDER #1

TO: Constituent Commanderies, Grand Commandery Officers, and Past Grand Commanders:

Be it hereby Ordered, that the Grand Commandery of Georgia shall remain organized into two Corps. The two Corps shall remain grouped into three Divisions each. The first Corp shall continue to contain Divisions One, Two and Three. The second Corp shall continue to be formed containing Divisions Four, Five and Six.

The assignment of each officer shall be as follows:

Division One Division Two Division Three Division Four Division Five Division Six The Grand Warder. The Grand Sword Bearer, The Grand Standard Bearer, The Grand Junior Warden, The Grand Senior Warden, The Grand Captain General.

Be it further Ordered, that the Grand Officer assigned to each Division shall also: Maintain direct communications with the Grand Commander and the Grand Recorder's office with respect to each Commandery as to ritual opening, tactics, armory, regalia, programs and any special needs or assistance. Visit each Commandery in their respective Division as often as needed but at least once during this Commandery year.

Represent the Grand Commander when requested to do so.

Be it further Ordered, the Grand Officer assigned to each Corps shall command, assist and oversee his respective Division.

Be it further Ordered, that the Division Commanders shall conduct all inspections in their Division unless a Grand Inspecting Officer is otherwise appointed by the Grand Commander. In such case the Division Commander shall assist the Grand Inspecting Officer so appointed.

LIAISON OFFICERS

Be it further Ordered, that two Liaison Officers be appointed by the Right Eminent Grand Commander to assist the Grand Officers assigned to each division in the various duties assigned. Liaison Officers report to and represent the Divisional Grand Officer, and while on official business, will be afforded the respect and honors due a Grand Commandery Officer.

Be it further Ordered, Liaison officers shall be appointed to serve within their respective Division. The Liaison Officers shall be expected to assist the Grand Commandery Officer, assigned as their Division Commander, in the duties of their office, relevant to that Division. The Liaison Officers shall wear a red shoulder cord as recognition of his office.

INSPECTIONS

All Commanderies shall be inspected by March 1, 2014.

Be it further Ordered, the Eminent Commander shall assemble the Sir Knights of his Commandery, on the assigned date, for the purpose of holding their annual inspection. The inspection shall be held in accordance with the Tactics and Customs of this Grand Jurisdiction. The Eminent Commander shall see that each

Sir Knight in the line be in full uniform. The full uniform consist of chapeau, black uniform coat, black trousers, black shoes, black socks, sword and belt. The wearing of this uniform symbolizes us as the Christian Soldiers within the Masonic Fraternity and we should each take pride in wearing it.

Be it further Ordered, that each Recorder is directed to furnish the Grand Inspecting Officer such information that will enable him to answer all questions on the inspection form. The completed inspection form is requested to be mailed to the office of the Grand Recorder within ten (10) days after the inspection.

Be it further Ordered, the Grand Commandery Statues require the Treasurer and Recorder of each Constituent Commandery to be bonded unless the Commandery by-laws require more than one signature on a voucher or check. The Grand Inspecting officer will verify if either method is in order. Proof of the last audit, showing date audited, will be provided to the Grand Inspecting Officer.

Be it further Ordered, all Officers, and Sir Knights in line be in full Templar uniform at inspection. Templar uniform consists of chapeau, white shirt, black tie, black coat, black trousers, black belt, black shoes, black socks, sword and belt.

CHARITIES

It is my hope that each Sir Knight within this Grand Jurisdiction shall continue to contribute to our charities as liberally as your ability permits. Let us continue our efforts to the Knight Templar Eye Foundation of Georgia Inc., and the Molly S. Moseley Eye Foundation Trust of Georgia Inc. I also encourage each Commandery to implement a program whereby funds will be set aside to sponsor a trip to the Holy Land for a Minister.

FESTIVALS

All Commanderies participating in festivals where all York Rite Degrees are conferred, are encouraged to confer the Templar Orders on a separate date when possible. In any case, when the Templar Orders are conferred, all candidates are to be appropriately dressed in coat and tie.
