JOINT MEMORIAL

The Joint Memorial/Divine Service was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Memorials were included in the preliminary reports for the following Grand Officers and Past Grand Officers who were remembered:

BILLY FRED ADAMS APRIL 12, 1929 – OCTOBER 8, 2019

I rise to answer the roll for Reverend Billy Fred Adams, who can no longer answer for himself. It is our hope and belief that he has gone to a better place, where there is no sickness and no sadness. A good and faithful servant, he was a private person and little was known about him and I am grateful for information provided by his son Barry Adams and by Billy's twin brother Bobby. Bobby is retired military and a sixty two year mason who lives in McDonough, Georgia and is a member of East Point Lodge No. 288.

Billy and his twin brother Bobby were born in 1929 in Newnan, Georgia. Their father died when they were three months old, and they were raised in the Atlanta Child's Home on Hightower Road in Atlanta, Georgia until they were ten years old and went into foster care. He attended Milton High School in Alpharetta and College Park High School in College Park.

He married Barbara Martin in 1951 and they were together for sixty two years until her death in 2013. They had one son and two grandsons. They lived in Smyrna, Georgia for a period of time and he worked for a linen supply company in Atlanta. He then entered Norman College at Norman Park, Georgia and they lived in Moultrie and he pastored at the Naylor Baptist Church.

About 1960, they moved to Rome, Georgia and he pastored the Spring Creek Baptist Church. On November 11, 1961, he became a Master Mason in Euharlee Lodge #457. In 1965, they moved to Fort Valley, Georgia where he was the pastor of Second Baptist Church, and he demitted his masonic membership to Fort Valley Lodge #110. While in Fort Valley, Billy joined the York Rite bodies, Austin Chapter #18, RAM, Fort Valley Council #35, RSM, and Ivanhoe Commandery #10, KT all in 1966. In 1967 he joined the Scottish Rite in the Valley of Macon, demitting to Atlanta in 1987 and in 2007 he demitted to the Valley of Knoxville, Tennessee.

In 1967 he was called to be the pastor of Porterfield Baptist Church in Macon, Georgia. This afforded him an opportunity to complete his education and he graduated from Georgia Southwestern College in 1968 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. By 1972 he must have been well known, for on May 11, 1972, he was elected Grand Prelate of the Grand Commandery of Georgia, a position he most ably filled for thirty three years, retiring in 2005. In 1974 he moved his masonic membership to Rutland Lodge #298 in Macon.

He remained at Porterfield Baptist Church until 1977 when he became the pastor of Riverside Baptist Church in Rome, Georgia, retiring from that church in 1992. In 1979 he transferred all of his masonic memberships to Rome and became very active in those bodies. He served as Eminent Commander of Rome Commandery #8 in 1987 and as Worshipful Master of Cherokee Lodge #66 in 1999. He affiliated with Seven Hills Daylight Lodge #751 as a dual member in 2000, demitting in 2015.

In 1994 he was elected Past Grand Commander, Honorary, by the Grand Commandery of Georgia and in 1995, he received the Knight Commander of the Temple Award from Grand Encampment. Billy served as the secretary recorder of the Rome York Rite bodies from 1990 till 2005 and enjoyed taking applications for folks who needed assistance from the Knights Templar Eye Foundation in order to have eye surgeries. He affiliated with Cyprus Commandery #23 in Maryville, Tennessee as a dual member in 2007.

After he retired from Riverside Baptist, he was shortly asked if he could fill in as a pastor at Oak Hill Methodist Church in Lylerly, Georgia which had no pastor at the time. He did "fill in" for almost ten years until he moved to Maryville, Tennessee. After moving to Tennessee, he was again asked to fill in as the pastor of Immanuel Methodist Church in Louisville, Tennessee which he did for several years, finally retiring around 2010. He also worked in a local funeral home around Maryville, Tennessee for several years.

In 2004, Billy wrote an article in the Masonic Messenger entitled "Light in our Darkness" where he asked "Friends, is thy word a light unto your path? Does thy word make life look brighter, does it bring the comfort and joy you seek in life? God's word gives light, God's word gives strength, God's word gives joy, God's word gives peace". Thank you Billy.

JOHN PLUNKETT BOHANAN JANUARY 21. 1930 – SEPTEMBER 11. 2019

Most Illustrious Companion John Plunkett "Doc" Bohanan was a great friend, Masonic Brother, Companion, Sir Knight and an all-around great human being. He served his fellow man and his country by his chosen profession, his work in the community and his Masonic travels. His mild demeanor and sense of humor made him a joy to be around and he will be truly missed. His memory will remain with those of us who knew and loved him for years to come.

Most Illustrious Companion John was born in Asheville, North Carolina on January 21, 1930. The family moved back to their original home place in Conyers, GA in 1934. He attended schools in Rockdale County and graduated High School in 1947. He then attended the University of Georgia where he earned a B.S. Degree in Agricultural Engineering and a commission in the U. S. Army Reserve in June 1951. He was then called to active duty in June 1951 in the US Army where he served for 2 years, 14 months of which being served in Japan. He later obtained his small aircraft pilot's license and flew with the Civil Air Patrol.

After serving his time in the U.S. Army, John returned to the University of Georgia where he earned a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine Degree in 1959. He worked for the U.S. Department of Agriculture for 3 years and then went to work for the Georgia Poultry Improvement Association as Veterinarian in Charge of the Canton Poultry Laboratory in 1962. He worked for the Georgia Poultry Improvement Association until he retired.

John "Doc" was a Life Member of the American Legion Post # 45 in Canton, Georgia.

John was initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason in Canton Lodge No. 77 on June 21, 1982. He was passed to the Degree of Fellowcraft on July 16, 1982 and Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on August 21, 1982. He served as Worshipful Master of Canton Lodge # 77 in 1995. He was given the honor of being named "Mason of the Year" by Canton Lodge No. 77 in 1995. He was appointed as District Deputy to the Grand Master in 1998 and served in that capacity for two years in 1998 and 1999. Most III. Companion John "Doc" was also a plural member of E.W. Hightower Lodge No. 679 and Georgia Mountain Daylight Lodge No. 758.

John received the Royal Arch Degrees on January 29 1983 in Canton Chapter No. 135 and served as High Priest in 1990. He was named "Royal Arch Mason of the Year" by the Ninth District Royal Arch Convention in 2001. He received the Order of High Priesthood. He was greeted in Canton Council No. 3 on February 7, 1983 and served as Illustrious Master in 1991. He served as the Illustrious

Master of the Northeast Georgia Council Convention in 1995-1996. He has received the Order of the Silver Trowel. John was knighted in Amicalola Commandery No. 41 on March 3, 1984 and served as Commander in 1995-1996. Sir Knight John was honored by the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the Unite States of America by being awarded "Knight Commander of the Temple" and he is also a member of the Grand Master's Club. John Plunkett "Doc" Bohanan was elected to serve as the Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Georgia in 2002. He served the craft with dignity and honor during his year as Most III. Grand Master. He also belonged to the following Masonic Organizations: Cherokee Rose Priory No. 56, KYCH; Rufus R. White Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; Luther G. Palmer York Rite College No. 123; Dave Keever Council No. 365, Allied Masonic Degrees, serving as Sovereign Master in 2002; Carl F. Lester Jr. Council No. 65 Knight Masons of the USA; The Royal Order of Scotland; Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Valley of Atlanta where he received the "Knight Commander Court of Honour" in November 1999: Appalachian Mountain Scottish Rite Association; Yaarab Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. and the Cherokee Shrine Club.

John is survived by his wife, June Phelps Bohanan, a son, John Allan Bohanan and step daughter, Julie Fulcher. He attended Canton Community Church. On behalf of the Officers and members of the York Rite Bodies of Georgia, I do, on this day, sadly report that Most Illustrious Companion John Plunkett Bohanan, "Doc" has departed this life with the eternal hope of entering into the Holy of Holies above and into the presence of the Grand Council of Heaven. "Doc" was loved and respected by all who knew him and will be missed by all. I humbly request that this Memorial and the passing of MI Companion John Plunkett Bohanan be placed in the permanent records of the York Rite of Georgia.

STEVE ALTON KIRK OCTOBER 30, 1944 – OCTOBER 17, 2019

Brother Steve was born in Washington, D.C. to Horace and Lucile Kirk, but attended the public schools of Pickens County, Georgia and Reinhardt Junior College. He joined the Air Force in 1966. He eventually resumed his education graduating from the University of Georgia with a degree in Technical and Adult Education. Upon his return from the Air Force, Steve was employed as a Ford Dealer Parts manager, sales-production coordinator for Calcium Product Division of Georgia Marble Company and Industrial Systems Instructor for Appalachian Technical College, retiring in 2003. Upon his retirement he began his own business contracting with Lowes to install appliances, retiring again in 2009. Brother Steve married Sherri Koehn in 1970 and was blessed with a daughter, Ami, son-in-law Kenny and grandchildren, Tyson and Peyton. Brother Steve was initiated in Pickens Star Lodge #220 in Jasper, Georgia on November 24, 1970, passed to the Degree of Fellowcraft on December 8, 1970, and raised as a Master Mason on January 16, 1971. He served as Worshipful Master in 1987 and later as Secretary for six years. He was currently serving as Senior Deacon of The Ninth Masonic District Convention. He joined Pickens Chapter #28, RAM, in Jasper on October 22, 1977, Pickens Council #55, RSM on March 11, 1989 and Amicalola Commandery #41, KT, on May 8, 1999. He was a past presiding officer of each body and was invited to membership in Cherokee Rose Priory #56, Knights of the York Cross of Honour on August 30, 2016. Brother Steve served York Rite Masonry well and was elected as the Right Eminent Grand Commander of Knights Templar in 2018. He became a member of the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry on May 23, 1992, which was the Statewide Freedom Class. He was invested with the Rank and Decoration of Knight Commander of the Court of Honour on October 4, 1999, and was Coroneted an Inspector General Honorary, 33° on November 17, 2007. From the time he joined, he worked on the stage crew and on December 1, 2007 he was appointed Stage Director for the Valley of Atlanta, a position he held until the end of 2018. He also became a Life Member in 2007 and in later years he was in the Fourth Degree. He was a Past President of the Appalachian Mountain Scottish Rite Association and a member of the "Traitor" cast. Brother Kirk was invited to become a member of most of the Appendant-Honorary Bodies in Georgia and served in a position of leadership in several of them. He was very active in the Order of Eastern Star, being initiated in Jasper Chapter #479 on June 23, 1979, serving as Worthy Patron several times and as a District Deputy. He served as Worthy Grand Patron of Georgia in 2009 and on the General Grand Chapter Committee for Scottish Rite Charities for the 2012-2015 Triennium. Brother Steve was a member of Cross Roads Baptist Church and served for nineteen years as Clerk-Treasurer and a Deacon since 1991. Brother Kirk's favorite pastimes were outdoor sports, including hunting, fishing, camping, anything the grandkids wanted to do, and traveling with Sherri. Sadly, he died accidentally at his deer camp near Davisboro, Georgia, doing what he loved.

He is survived by his wife, Sherri, a daughter, Ami, son-in-law, Kenny, and two grandchildren, Tyson and Peyton. Brother Steve was 74 years old. He is greatly missed by all the Brethren and Companions of Georgia.

JOSEPH PIERCE SUTTLES JANUARY 19, 1926 – SEPTEMBER 11, 2019

Brother, Companion and Sir Knight Joe Suttles, in his years here with us, contributed greatly to humanity and our country. His zest for life as well as his accomplishments individually will not soon be forgotten and we are much better for his life here on earth. He was a kind, generous and compassionate Christian friend to many of us who traveled many miles with him to some remote place to confer degrees or offer assistance. He was truly a 3M man, Methodist, Marine and Mason, in that order.

Upon graduation from High School in 1943 at 17 years old, Brother Suttles joined the United States Marine Corps F Company, 2nd Battalion where he served with the First Division in the South Pacific, Guadalcanal, Okinawa and North China. He was wounded in battle and is a recipient of our country's Purple Heart Award and a Presidential Unit Citation. He served in the Marines until 1946.

He afterwards attended Emory-at-Oxford where he served as President of both the Phi Gamma Literary Society and the Letterman's Club. He worked for Standard Auto Parts and then became Fleet Parts Manager for Fulton County Board of Education, retiring from there.

Our Brother Joe was involved with the Atlanta Old-Time Baseball Players, the Utoy and Wesley Chapel Cemetery Associations, the Boy Scouts and served as a Little League Coach. Utoy Baptist Church was the oldest Baptist Church in Fulton County and Brother Joe served as President of the Cemetery Association. Brother Suttles was initiated in Ben Hill Lodge #674 on March 12, 1948, passed to the Degree of Fellowcraft on April 9, 1948, and raised as a Master Mason on April 28, 1948 serving as Worshipful Master in 1967. He served as Secretary of the Lodge from 1975 to 1984. He served as District Deputy to the Grand Master in the

Fifth District from 1979 to 1987 and as Worshipful Master of the Fifth District Masonic Convention in 1989. He also served as President of the Georgia Masonic Secretaries Association in 1981. He was appointed in 1987 as Third Grand Steward of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Georgia by William M. Hutcheson, and he served with distinction as Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Georgia in 1995. He was very active in Grand Lodge serving on several Committees. Due to the closing of his beloved Ben Hill Lodge #674 on September 11, 2018, Brother Joe affiliated with College Park Lodge #454 on September 24, 2018

He joined Ben Hill Chapter #37, RAM on September 21, 1948, East Point Council #23, RSM on December 28, 1948 and Coeur de Lion Commandery #4, KT on May 20, 1972. Ben Hill Chapter #37 was consolidated in 2002 and he became a member of Mt. Horeb Chapter #155. He also demitted from East Point Council #23 affiliating with Euclid Council #33 in 1977. He was a past presiding officer of all these bodies and was invited to membership in Cherokee Rose Priory #56, Knights of the York Cross of Honour on May 31, 1983. There he achieved much fame as King Nebuchadnezzar in the Super Excellent Master Degree.

He was very active in the York Rite travelling thousands of miles with the State Degree Team. He was elected as Most Excellent Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons in Georgia in 1999, Right Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Georgia, KT in 1986 and Most Illustrious Grand Master, Honorary, of the Grand Council, RSM in 2001. It was during his term as Grand Commander that Georgia became the first state in the Grand Encampment of the United States of America to become 100% Life Sponsors to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation (\$30 for every commandery member state-wide). He was appointed Grand Treasurer of The Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons and Grand Treasurer of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar in 1990 and served until 2009.

He received the General Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons, International, Distinguished Service Award in 1980, the Knights Templar Cross of Honor in 1980 and the General Grand Council Cryptic Masons, International, Distinguished Service Award in 1992. Only four Georgia Members to date have ever received all three awards. He also received the General Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons, International, Ephraim Kirby Award in 2017 given to recognize Companions who have attained past presiding rank in the York Rite and who have then gone on to continue their work and commitment to service even beyond their term of office, or beyond the normal boundaries of dedication. Such was Brother Joe!!!!

Brother Suttles was invited to become a member of all the Appendant-Honorary Bodies in Georgia and served in a position of leadership in many of them as well as filling major ritualistic parts in several.

He became a member of the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry on June 1, 1974 as a member of the Ras Hitson Cleveland, 33° Class. It is interesting to see that his petition was signed by William M. Hutcheson and James Sheffield Thompson, two of his closest friends. He was invested with the Rank and Decoration of Knight Commander of the Court of Honour on October 19, 1981, and was Coroneted an Inspector General Honorary, 33° on November 30, 1985. He was very active in the Scottish Rite serving as President of the South Side Scottish Rite Association in 2003 and Venerable Master of the Lodge of Perfection in 2002. He also served as Degree Master of the 31st Degree for several years and as Chairman of the Executive Committee for several years. He was also an honorary member of East Side Scottish Rite Association.

Brother Joe was a long time member of Mount Gilead United Methodist Church where he served for more than fifty years as Adult Sunday School teacher, Lay

Leader, trustee and member of the Administrative Board. His wife Fae of almost sixty-nine years, one son, one daughter, and two grandchildren, survive him. His labors on earth have ended, but his memory in Georgia Freemasonry shall endure. Farewell Brother Joe until we meet again.

He served in the U.S. Army, Honorably Discharged in 1946.

He graduated from Salem College, BS/BA 1949.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

GRAND COMMANDERY

Sir Knights: As Chairman of the Grand Commandery Membership Committee, I would like to take an opportunity to thank our Right Eminent Grand Commander for his vote of confidence in appointing me to this very important committee. Secondly, I could not begin to write a membership committee report without giving my sincerest and heartfelt acknowledgement of gratitude and appreciation to all the Sir Knights who have served on this committee with me this past year. It is by their hard work and dedication, and not my own, that I make the following report:

As part of this Triennium, the Grand Master of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar has emphasized in no uncertain terms his desire to see growth in membership across all constituent jurisdictions. As such, our Right Eminent Grand Commander also made it a goal to push for increased membership here in Georgia.

In reviewing the membership committee reports available from May 2010 until present, it was noted that the Grand Commandery of Georgia has consistently experienced large numbers of net losses over the past decade. The graph below (fig. 1) represents the total number of Sir Knights on record, as well as the increases, decreases, and net loss for each year:






If we look at the total numbers of Sir Knights per year (fig. 2), we see the consistent downward trend in membership per annum. What makes this figure so concerning to your committee and myself, is that we have fewer than half as many Sir Knights in 2020 as we did in 2010. The number has dropped from 4418 Sir Knights across the state to 2115. Sir Knights, this loss is unsustainable!

We began to also look at the numbers of increases and decreases per year, to see how we were both gaining and losing members. As expected, most of the gains came from creating new Sir Knights (fig. 3), with most losses coming from deaths (fig. 4).






In gathering these data, it became clear to us that, to reverse the course, we must not only create ("Recruit) new Knights Templar, but also reach out to those we've lost to suspensions ("Reinstate") and then keep ALL of the Sir Knights that we possibly could ("Retain").

The men on this committee have worked tirelessly throughout this year to this end. Some of our Commanderies have really risen to the challenge. Because of this, we are pleased to report that for the first time in well over a decade, we have a net loss of fewer than 100 Sir Knights. On average, given the data available for our review, we have lost approximately 233 Sir Knights per year (fig. 5). This year, we have a net loss of 80 Sir Knights, reducing the average net loss by 66%! To achieve this, we saw both a higher number of increases (fig. 6) and a lower number of decreases (fig. 7) than some previously reported years.




Grand Commandery

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION AND HISTORICAL COMMITTEE GRAND COMMANDERY

To the Grand Commandery of Georgia, Knights Templar, the Education and Historical Committee makes the following report:

Let us remember those who have made an indelible impression on Templary in Georgia, and have completed their earthly labors. On this particular occasion, we, your committee recalls one illustrious in the history of our fraternity:

EARL DOUGLAS HARRIS GRAND COMMANDER, 2002 APRIL 9, 1947 – JULY 23, 2002 Earl Douglas Harris was perhaps the most prolific masonic researcher and writer in Georgia, and one of the most honored Georgia masons of all times. He has laid down his working tools of life: the pen, pencil, yellow legal pad and word processor and departed from among us leaving an unfilled void. He was a friend, brother and advisor to all that knew him.

Earl's early life was spent earning the Eagle Scout, god and country, and order of the arrow awards in the boy scouts and being an honor graduate from Oconee county high school. He then attended the University of Georgia where he was the chief justice of the student judiciary for almost four years and a member and officer of numerous honor societies and fraternities. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in agricultural engineering in 1970, a master of business administration degree in 1973 and the juris doctor degree also in 1973. He worked for the U.S. Department of Agriculture in the early 1970's and from 1973 – 1992 maintained a law practice in Watkinsville and Athens while also serving as the city attorney for two towns, county attorney and juvenile court judge pro tem. In 1992, he left the private practice of law and at the time of his death was the assistant commissioner for administration of the Georgia Department of Agriculture.

An active churchman, Earl served the Presbyterian Church in numerous capacities. At various times he was a Sunday school teacher, clerk of the session, deacon and elder. He was also the first president and trustee chair of the Northeast Georgia Presbytery.

Earl was made a master mason in Amity Lodge #731 on December 29, 1973. In the Masonic fraternity, he found his true calling and over the next twenty-nine years, he served every branch of freemasonry with honor and distinction. He was appointed to the grand lodge line in 1981 and served as Grand Master of Masons in Georgia in 1989. He continued to serve as the chairman and member of many grand lodge committees. The publications committee of grand lodge presented him a literary achievement award in 1991 in recognition of his outstanding contributions to the Masonic Messenger.

In addition to his grand lodge literary award, brother Earl served as master of Georgia lodge of Research in 1992, having already been elected a "fellow" in 1990. He was the fifth Walter M. Callaway Memorial Lecturer for the lodge in 1999. He presented many papers to the lodge and in 2000, he indexed all of the transactions by author's name and by title of the papers presented. In 1991, Georgia was granted authority to form a college of the Masonic Societas Rosicruciana in Civitatibus Foederatis. This is a research type body that researches and explores the philosophy and theosophy of freemasonry. Membership is limited and by invitation only. Brother Earl was called to be the charter celebrant of the college, and in 2001, he was appointed the Chief Adept of the college by the Supreme High Council, Rosicrucian Society of the United States.

Brother Earl joined the Scottish Rite early in his Masonic career and soon became very active. His activities were soon recognized and in 1979, he was elected to the Rank and Decoration of Knight Commander Court of Honour. He was elected an Inspector General, Honorary, 33° in 1987. He was appointed Deputy of the Supreme Council in Georgia in 2000 and at the biennial session of Supreme Council in 2001, he was elected Sovereign Grand Inspector General for the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry in the Orient of Georgia, which position he filled with honor and enthusiasm.

Brother Earl also became very active in the York Rite side of Freemasonry and served not only his local Chapter, Council and Commandery, but also gave freely

of his counsel and wisdom to the Grand Chapter, Grand Council and Grand Commandery. He served for several years as Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee for all three grand bodies. He was elected to the Grand Commandery line in 1994 and was elected Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Georgia, Knights Templar in 2002. He was also elected Grand High Priest, Honorary, of the Grand Chapter of Georgia, Royal Arch Masons and Illustrious Grand Master, Honorary, of the grand council of Georgia, royal and select masters, at their annual sessions in 2002.

Brother Earl was also elected to all of the appendant and honorary Masonic organizations in Georgia whose membership is predicated on membership in the York or Scottish Rite Bodies. These include St. Ambrose Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine, Cherokee Rose Priory #56, Knights York Cross of Honour, (Past Prior), Fidelitas Tabernacle #77, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests, (Past Preceptor), Luther G. Palmer York Rite College #123, (Past Governor and Associate Regent and Order of Purple Cross), Allied Masonic Degrees, (Past Sovereign Master). Knight Masons and the Royal Order of Scotland. In 1995, Brother Earl became the fifth recipient of the highest award that grand lodge can bestow on any of its members, the Dewey Harold Wollstein award, awarded only in intervals of five or more years, the recipient must have contributed to masonic growth by his writings or through the sharing of his wisdom and knowledge of masonry, in-state or nationwide, and must be recognized by his peers as a humble servant of god and his fellowman. On this particular occasion, we, your Committee, recalls one such Illustrious in our Fraternity:

RICHARD SAVILLE SAGAŔ GRAND HIGH PRIEST, 1974 JUNE 16, 1916 – DECEMBER 11, 2013

Companion Sagar was born in London, England, one of five children. Completing his education in private schools, he attended London University earning a Bachelor of Science Degree in Electrical and Mechanical Engineering and then attended the Chartered Surveyors Institute of England finally earning certification as an Accredited Cargo Surveyor and Valuer for Lloyds of London. Brother Sagar was employed by a British firm in Sarawak, British Borneo in the South China Sea in 1936, where he worked until the outbreak of World War II. Initially, he became a soldier in the 2/15th Battalion, Punjabi Regiment of the Indian Army, and for a time was a prisoner of the Japanese. Escaping from the Japanese in most ordinary fashion, he trekked through Indonesia and ended-up in Australia. There, he became a member of the Royal Australian Air Force and served as Master Navigator/Radio Specialist and Photographer for rest of the war, with rank of Chief Warrant Officer. Granted a Commission shortly before end of the war, he was reassigned to the British Army in June 1945 for special services with rank of Captain.

Leaving Malaysia in 1955 and returning to England, Brother Sagar received a position in charge of heavy machinery export sales in New York and he and his family arrived in United States the following year. Transferring to the Atlanta area

around 1960, Dick started his own company Sagar Tool Company, Inc. which sold high quality hand and power tools. Retiring from his main business in 1981, after a cardiac attack and open-heart surgery, he went on to serve as building manager of the Atlanta Masonic Center until 2001. He then served as librarian of the Atlanta Masonic Library and curator of the Atlanta Masonic Museum. During this period, his sight began to deteriorate, and in 2004, he was declared legally blind. He retired as librarian and curator.

He was Initiated 10-23-1948, Passed 1-8-1949 and Raised 5-14-1949 in Elliott Lodge No. 3557 (English Constitution) in Malacca, Malaysia. He served as Worshipful Master of the Lodge in 1953. Holding multiple memberships, Brother Sagar has also been a member in Lodge Zetland-In-The-East No. 508 (EC), St. Michael Research Lodge No. 2993 (EC), Read Lodge No. 2337 (EC), Ailsa Lodge No. 1172 (SC), St. Andrew Lodge No. 1437 (SC), and Tullibardine-In-The-East Lodge No. 1118 (SC). Later Brother Sagar was a founder and became a life member of Lodge Sarawak No. 1452 (SC). In 1954, our Brother was appointed 'Overseas Provincial' Grand Steward in District Grand Lodge of Eastern Archipelago (EC) covering Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand and Borneo. He resigned from these lodges when he became resident in the State of Georgia, owing to the restriction on multiple memberships...a restriction that is no longer in force.

After moving to Georgia he became a member of several lodges over the years: Tucker #42, affiliated in the early 1960's; Forest Park #399, affiliated in the later 1960's; Buckhead #712, affiliated in the early 1970's, served as Worshipful Master in 1976 and was serving as Secretary when the charter was surrendered 12-2-1983; Peachtree #732, affiliated in 1984? In addition, was serving as Secretary when lodge consolidated with Atlanta #59 on 12-27-1997. While a member of Peachtree #732, he was one of the founders and Secretary of Metro Daylight Lodge No. 743 that was chartered on 10-27-1992. He also affiliated with Gate City #2 on 5-11-1999, remaining a member until 2-27-2007, when he demitted to Cartersville #63, which he was a member of at his death. He affiliated with Cobb County Daylight #742 (now James E Sledge Daylight #742) on 6-13-2001 and soon became the editor of their newsletter. The newsletter was read and enjoyed by many local members. He was also a member of this lodge at his death. After affiliating with Cobb County Daylight #742, he demitted from both Metro Daylight Lodge #743 and Atlanta Peachtree #59 in October of 2001.

He received the Grand Lodge of Georgia "Literary Achievement" Award, in 1988. This was the first presentation of the award. In 2005, he was presented the "Dewey H. Wollstein" Award by the Grand Lodge of Georgia, its highest award. Named for an outstanding Georgia Past Grand Master and Masonic Scholar, it is given no more frequently than once every five years. He was only the seventh person ever to receive it.

Mark Master Masonry is somewhat different under the English Constitution than it is in the United States. Companion Sagar was advanced in Edaljee Khory Mark Master Lodge No. 436 EC. He was also advanced in Mayhew Royal Ark Mariner Lodge No. 436 EC. He was a founder and Charter Commander Noah of North Atlanta Royal Ark Mariner Lodge No. 313 GA in 1994.

Companion Sagar was exalted in Dalhousie Chapter No. 508 (EC) in 1949. Founder and Charter Secretary of St. Andrew Chapter No. 748 (SC); 1950. Third Principal in 1955. Demitted in 1961 and affiliated with Sweetwater Chapter No. 49 at Luxomni, Georgia on 2-27-1962. Served as High Priest of Sweetwater Chapter No. 49 Georgia, in 1964. Demitted from Sweetwater No. 49 on 6-25-

1968 and affiliated with Mt. Carmel Chapter No. 98 on 7-10-1968, served as Most Excellent Grand High Priest of Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Georgia in 1974. Georgia then had 125 Royal Arch Chapters with approximately 24,000 members. He demitted from Panthersville No. 98 on 9-14-1988 and affiliated with Mt. Zion Chapter No. 16 on 11-12-1988. Affiliated with Sweetwater Chapter No. 49 on 1-13-2004, as a dual member. Demitted from Mt. Zion No. 16 on 5-3-2007 and affiliated with Cartersville Chapter No. 144 on 9-25-2007. He is the recipient of General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International's "Bronze Medal" in 1965. In addition, that organization's "Silver Medal" in 1987 (No. 37). The former is issued one per State annually, the latter one per Region (approximately 8 to 10 States) every three years. He served as Chairman of Educational Committee of General Grand Chapter of R.A.M. International for 12 years. In 2002, he was appointed General Grand Librarian for three years by the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International, with particular reference to cataloging and displaying the "Ray V. Denslow Masonic Library" at the Atlanta Masonic Library.

He was greeted in Ailsa Cryptic Council No. 602 (SC) in 1951. Upon arriving in Georgia, he joined DeKalb Council No. 21 and served as Illustrious Master in 1965. He became a charter member of Panthersville Council #76 on 4-21-1976. Demitted on 9-14-1988 to Jason Burr Council #13. Demitted on 5-3-2007 from Jason Burr #13 and affiliated with Minor C. Shadburn Council #49 on 9-25-2007. He was knighted in Golden Chersonese Preceptory No. 290 (EC). In the United States, he joined DeKalb Commandery No. 38 Knight Templar and served as Eminent Commander in 1965. As he was a past presiding officer of all these bodies, he was invited to membership in Cherokee Rose Priory #56, Knights of the York Cross of Honour on November 29, 1967.

He became a member of the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry on November 3, 1962 as a member of the David Marx, 33° Class. He was invested with the Rank and Decoration of Knight Commander of the Court of Honour on October 15, 1973, and was Coroneted an Inspector General Honorary, 33° on December 8, 1979. He was very active in the Scottish Rite serving as Assistant Classroom Director. Assistant Director of Associations and Venerable Master of the Lodge of Perfection in 1985. In 1988, he became a Life Member of the Scottish Rite by virtue of securing a minimum of 35 petitions for membership or affiliation. Companion Sagar was not only invited to become a member of almost all of the Appendant-Honorary Bodies in Georgia, he was the organizer and presiding officer of many of them: Luther G. Palmer York Rite College #123, 1998; North Atlanta Council #313, Allied Masonic Degrees, 1994; Carl F. Lester Jr., Council No. 65 of Knight Masons, 1997; Georgia College of Societas Rosicruciana In Civitatibus Foederatis (SRICF), 1991, first Chief Adept IX grade, Fidelitas Tabernacle No. LXXVII, in Atlanta, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests, 1998. He was also a member of St. Ambrose Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine and served as its Secretary for nine years.

He was one of the founders and charter members of Research Lodge #104 in 1966 serving as Master in 1972. This became Research Lodge #6 in 1977 and in January of 1988, it became Georgia Lodge of Research. Brother Sagar was again called to serve as Master in 1989 and was elected the first Fellow of the Lodge that year. He was also in 1994 elected a Fellow in the Philalethes Society, the oldest independent Masonic research society in North America organized in 1928.

Let us remember those who have made an indelible impression on Cryptic Masonry in Georgia and have completed their earthly labors. On this particular occasion, we, your Committee, recalls one illustrious in our fraternity.

LUTHER GUELDA PALMER MOST ILLUSTRIOUS GRAND MASTER, 1981 DECEMBER 28, 1908 – JUNE 11, 1987

Luther Guelda Palmer was born in Atlanta, Georgia on December 28, 1908, the son of Guelda Boyett Palmer and Pauline Webb Palmer. He received his education in the public schools of Jacksonville, Florida and Atlanta, Georgia. After completing his public education, Companion Palmer began his work as an electrician and continued in that vocation until his retirement.

On November 11, 1929, he was married to the former Elsie Lou Quaintance of Jacksonville, Florida and to this union were born two daughters, Mrs. Betty Dean and Mrs. Barbara Briscoe. There were also five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Companion Palmer was raised in W. D. Luckie Lodge No. 89 of Atlanta on October 6, 1939 and served as Worshipful Master in 1947. At the time of his death, he was serving in his 26th year as Secretary of that Lodge.

He was Exalted as a Royal Arch Mason in Mount Horeb Chapter No. 155 on April 9, 1943 and served as High Priest in 1954. He was a member of the Council of anointed High Priests of Georgia.

He was Greeted as a Select Master in Euclid Council No. 33 on April 12, 1943 and served as Illustrious Master in 1947. He was a member and Past Thrice Illustrious Master of the Grand Council of the Order of the Silver Trowel in Georgia.

Companion Palmer was Knighted as a Knight Templar in Atlanta Commandery No. 9 on May 22, 1947 and served as Commander for the Templar year 1962-63. He was a member of Cherokee Rose Priory No. 56, Knights of the York Cross of Honour. Additionally, for several years prior to be elected to the progressive line of that body, he served with distinction as Registrar.

Other Masonic and Masonically related affiliations included Yaarab Shrine; Valley of Atlanta, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Royal Order of Scotland; St. Ambrose Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; Upper Room Tabernacle No. XLV, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests.

On April 21, 1976, Companion Palmer was elected to the Line of the Grand Council of Georgia until he was elected as Most Illustrious Grand Master on April 20, 1981. Companion Palmer served with distinction throughout his entire service in the Grand Line and was known throughout the State of Georgia for his fine ritualistic work. In recognition for his many years of devoted and dedicated service to Cryptic Masonry in Georgia, he was the first recipient in Georgia of the General Grand Council Distinguished Service Medal, granted in 1975. Companion Palmer was, for a number of years, a very active member of the Methodist Church, serving in various capacities of responsibility, and for the last few years of his life was a member of the Powers Ferry United Methodist Church of Marietta.

Finally, after an illness of several months, Luther answered the Lord's call on June 11, 1987; he was interred on June 14, 1987 at the Georgia Memorial Park in Marietta.

On a final note, upon the formation of a York Rite College in Atlanta in 1988, the College was aptly named, Luther G. Palmer York Rite College No. 123 to honor the memory of "Mr. Council Mason in Georgia."

These changes have not been received and are needed to correct the By-Laws.

Your Committee has before it a complete revision of the bylaws of G. Everett Cox Council No. 60. Your Committee recommends approval of the submitted By-Laws subject to a future revision on vacancies.

Your Committee is aware of adopted changes to the By-Laws of Fayetteville Council No.66 making several changes. However, no changes have been submitted for review or approval. Your Committee therefore cannot recommend approval of these By-Laws.

This committee has before it some paperwork and proposed By-Laws praying for a Charter to issue forth for a Council in Jesup, Wayne County, Georgia which has been operating under Dispensation since June 24, 2019. These Companions further requested that they be allowed to use the name and number of the former council in Jesup, Ga, being Jesup Council #42, which was declared defunct in 1932. However #42 was reassigned in 1954 to Triangle Council at Madison who just forfeited their charter in 2018. While the Grand Council Code is silent, the Grand Chapter code says that a charter may be restored within five years. (your committee will submit a bill in 2021to add this provision to the Grand Council code) The reusing of #42 this early will result in major membership problems for the Grand Recorders office and the local recorder. Therefore your Committee recommended that the companions use Jesup #70, the same as their chapter or Jesup #84, the next available number.

The companions have agreed to use Jesup #70 as the name of their council and your committee recommends approval of granting them a charter.

Most of our issues are due to water related concerns, both drainage and retention, and the effects they have on a century old structure.

Unfortunately, it would be safe to assume that the expenses to maintain our beloved Masonic building will continue to grow. Although we can repair many things, we are somewhat limited to what can be done with a nearly 100 year old facility. Moving forward, your Building Trustees will be bringing forth recommendations as to what our options are.

We would be remiss if we did not mention the passing of Mr. Charles Irvin, our building custodian for many years. Ms. Julie Hickman has been caring for our custodial issues since last March and is doing an outstanding job. Your committee on Royal Arch Research Assistance make the following report: It is important to note that all donations given to RARA for this year were given in the memory of our Dear Excellent Companion Robert Donald Wing (October 27, 1962 – June 17, 2019), a mighty man and Mason who is and will forever be missed by many. His dedication to service to this great Grand Chapter and his chairmanship of the Georgia Royal Arch Research Assistance Committee has set the gold-standard. In humble love and affection, we dedicate and memorialize our efforts in helping those with Central Auditory Processing Disorder to our beloved Companion, Robert Donald Wing.

My sincere gratitude goes out to MEGHP James W. Tate for appointing me Chairman of the Georgia RARA Committee for this year; however, it is with a heavy heart that this was done upon our beloved Excellent Companion Robert D. Wing being exalted to the Celestial Chapter above. I am so honored to serve with the other members of the Georgia RARA Committee: RE John Henry Johnson, Grand Scribe, and Excellent Roger W. Buterbaugh, Grand Sentinel. I thank them for their valuable assistance in presenting the RARA story at each of our District Conventions as well as at other Chapter and Lodge events.

At this time Georgia Royal Arch Masons are ranked number 2 in the East Region and number 6 nationally in total donations to Royal Arch Research Assistance. Between March 6, 2019 and March 6, 2020, Georgia Royal Arch Masons donated a total of \$15,495.66. Significant donations were given by Mt. Zion Chapter No. 16 (\$4,000) and Alleghaney No. 64 (\$900). REPORT OF THE CRYPTIC MASONS MEDICAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION COMMITTEE

The CMMRF started off with a bang, but just when we were starting to get going with the Conventions, this silent killer called COVID-19 hit us with a world-wide pandemic. That may have slowed us down, but it sure isn't going to stop us.

One of the things that I would like to mention is that patients with Critical Limb Threatening Ischemia (CLTI) have a severe blood flow reduction and foot pain even at rest. Over 53,000 leg amputations are performed each year for complications related to CLTI, with diabetics and minorities at a higher risk. Thanks to the generous support of the Cryptic Masons, they have completed the Phase III Mobile (Marrowstim Treatment of Limb Ischemia in Subjects with Severe Peripheral Arterial Disease) Trial. The results of the Mobile Trial clearly demonstrate a significant reduction in leg amputations for patients with CLTI. This is a breakthrough for a condition which previously had no treatment. This was done with the help of the Cryptic Masons of Georgia. The last Annual Report that I received listed Georgia as 8th in donations. Thanks to all the Georgia Cryptic Masons for your support of the CMMRF.

REPORT OF THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR EYE FOUNDATION 52ND VOLUNTARY CAMPAIGN & MOLLIE S. MOSELEY EYE FOUNDATION TRUST, INC.

To the Right Eminent Grand Commander, Grand Commandery Officers, and Sir Knights: It has been a privilege to serve as Chairman of the Knights Templar Eye Foundation 52nd Voluntary Campaign and the Mollie S. REPORT OF THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION, DIVISION OF GEORGIA AND THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION OF GEORGIA, INC. AND THE MOLLIE S. MOSELEY EYE FOUNDATION TRUST OF GEORGIA, INC.

To the Right Eminent Grand Commander, Officers and Sir Knights of the Grand Commandery of Georgia:

This Committee is charged with the responsibility of administering the funds of the Knights Templar Educational Foundation, Division of Georgia, and the funds of our solely owned Corporation, Knights Templar Educational Foundation of Georgia, Inc. and the funds of the Mollie S. Moseley Eye Foundation Trust of Georgia. Inc.

The Division funds, Knights Templar Educational Foundation, Division of Georgia, Inc., which are controlled by rules and regulations of the Grand Encampment allowed the Committee to award five \$1,000 scholarships to deserving students to further their education.

The Corporation funds, controlled by the Trustees, approved a \$50,000 gift to Emory University and a \$50,000 gift to Augusta University; five \$1,000 scholarships to deserving students; and budgeted to assist eight ministers for visits to the Holy Land.

The Mollie S. Moseley Eye Foundation Trust of Georgia, Inc. funds are invested with only the interest to be used. The Foundation sent \$20,000 to KTEF, Grand Encampment, allowing the purchase of two additional Golden Chalices. We are pleased to report that the Knights Templar Educational Foundation, Division of Georgia funds has a present net worth of \$307,951. The present net worth of our solely owned Corporation, Knights Templar Educational Foundation of Georgia, Inc. funds is \$4,181,865, and the Mollie S. Moseley Foundation Trust of Georgia stands at \$736,114; the Grand Chapter Investment holds \$313,524.99, and the Grand Commandery Investment holds \$434,736.11. Since REPGC James B. Phillips' term on the Committee expires at this Grand Convocation, this Committee recommends that the Grand Commander nominate and the Grand Commandery approve REPGC James B. Phillips to succeed himself for another five-year term on the Committee, expiring in 2025. Presentations of the monetary gifts were made at a luncheon hosted by the Committee at The Back Burner on February 7 of this year.

As always, our records, financial and otherwise, are available for review by anyone interested. We wish to thank our Secretary and Staff Mark A. Bradley/Wade Smith/Ms. Marla for their complete involvement with the Committee and the timely announcements and record keeping that keeps us abreast of the status of all of our accounts.

You will need to ask for their permission to participate in their ceremonies. Most will gladly allow you, because, these days, the only ones attending are the veterans themselves, their families, and politicians. If you do this in uniform, you can expect the veterans to ask you who you are. You tell them and tell them about our charities, the Knights Templar Eye Foundation and the Holy Land Pilgrimage for pastors. All the younger veterans today are all volunteers: they are joiners and a lot still miss being in a uniform. They may then ask how to join our organization. You tell them that first they must be a Mason. If they ask how to become a Mason, give them a petition and tell them where the

To the Right Eminent Grand Commander, Grand Officers, and Members of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Georgia:

Your committee on Constitution/Statutes/Regulations wishes to make the following report:

Your Committee has researched this Committee back to 1913 and finds no such committee.

We further researched the CONSTITUTION, STATUTES, DISCIPLINARY RULES, STANDING RESOLUTIONS, CEREMONIES, FORMS AND APPROVED DECISIONS OF THE Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States of America, 2019 EDITION Including Approved Decisions of the Grand Masters and all decisions 1910 through 2018 Revised March 28, 2019

and we find in Section 3 of the Constitution, JURISDICTION AND POWER, the following: "When the Grand Encampment amends or revises its laws, the Statutes and Regulations of a Grand Commandery in conflict therewith should be promptly made to conform, regardless of any local requirement that amendments shall lie over for a year before action may be taken. (1937, p. 31 &330, No. 14 Agnew)"

Your Committee believes that if this is the function of this Committee, this function should more properly be handled by the Jurisprudence Committee since their function is to consider and report upon all matters which may be properly referred to them—generally, questions of Templar law and regulations. To date, there has been no applications for relief, but we are experiencing something we haven't seen since the Spanish Flu (also known as the 1918 Flu Pandemic), which was an unusually deadly influenza pandemic, lasting from January 1918 to December 1920. It infected 500 million people, about a quarter of the population at that time. The death toll estimated anywhere from 17 million to 50 million and possibly as high as 100 million.

The Coronavirus (COVID-19) is here and it doesn't seem like we are going to contain it anytime soon enough. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure: fever, cough, and shortness of breath. Warning signs are trouble breathing, persistent pain in the chest, new confusion or inability to arouse, bluish lips or face. Please take care of yourself and families and may God be with us. Marla manages all Quick Books, banking, purchasing, and postal needs/requirements. She has become an even better researcher, writer, proofer, publisher. Finally, she has become a super team member with our Grand Secretary/Recorder. She and Mark are an outstanding team. Together, they have accomplished an incredible amount of superb upgrades this past year.

A special thanks is extended to all of you for your thoughtful insight in selecting and electing MEPGHP Mark A. Bradley as your Grand Secretary/Recorder. You could not have made a better selection. Having managed a very success business for 21 years, Brother Mark brings a wealth of supervision and management experience and skills to this office. His every decision is driven by research and seeking input and recommendations from other trusted cohorts. His decisions are always driven by the paradigm of what is best for these beloved Grand York Rite Bodies - never emotional based. Most Excellent Companion Mark has exhibited a constant, focused, desire to daily search for means and methods to elevate the prestige and professional stature of these

bodies. He promised when he came on board that he would devote his efforts and energies toward moving these bodies to even loftier, professional heights. He has lived up to that promise. The database upgrade is a good example of Mark's desire for professional excellence. When he came on board these three bodies were dealing with a 20th century data management system which mandated that every change be uploaded, transmitted, downloaded and re uploaded in the Grand Body Database. Thanks to Mark's innate ingenuity and business acumen he researched feasible approaches to an upgrade, found and formed a technology group that researched and developed a means of permitting each secretary/recorder to enter data directly on this office's new system and thus manage their entire data bases, thus eliminating many steps and errors. A tremendous leap from an antiquated behemoth into a twenty first century data management system that now exceeds the Grand Lodge's Database System. ME Companion Mark and Marla Horton, our outstanding administrative assistant, did all of the trouble shooting and revisions to the new system and have as a result of hat extensive involvement become experts on the new system. Consequently they now handle all secretary/recorders' questions instead of paying an outside technology person to manage the processes and answer the questions. Secondly, Mark has changed all CPA managed accounts to a December 31 fiscal cut off, thus enhancing the focused management of those accounts. Since SunTrust has merged with BB&T their services have diminished and Mark is now in negotiations with Wells Fargo to assume all York Rite banking and investment needs. The process would have been completed last April, except for the Virus intervention. Mark has revitalized the Building and Finance Committees' significance. The Finance Committee meets and views all financial processes each quarter thus permitting them to finalize the annual budget as a given product of their four previous meetings. See the below the recommended 2020 through 2021 budget and the finance report on the 2019-2020 expenditures - another great improvement! The Building Committee is now meeting quarterly and has tackled solving the building water seepage problem, a problem that evaded me for nine years. That problem was a major deterrent to maintaining this beautiful Temple.

My beloved York Rite Leaders, we all need to commend our Grand Secretary/Recorder for the Fantastic job that he has done in researching and setting up a Virtual Grand York Rite Session, a once in a hundred-year event. A special commendation is extended to him for his superb negation with the motel. They have agreed to drop all contract penalties which saved us \$22,000.00. A distinguished York Rite Mason will donate Election Buddy and General Grand Council will donate ZOOM, a \$2,000.00 savings. Great job ME Sir. My Companions all – We need to keep our Grand Secretary/Recorder and Administrative Assistant. They are an outstanding team. We are very fortunate to have these two managing our administration, finances, and building preservation processes.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the MEGHP, MIGM, REGC, and the Companions and Sir Knights of the York Rite Bodies of Georgia:

The Finance Committee met on a quarterly basis to review the books and reconcile the checking accounts. Our job was made easier by the excellent record keeping and the presentation of all the accounts. The Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, and the Administrative Assistant are to be commended for their efforts to be good stewards of our money and to make it easy to review bank statements and accounts.

We found over the course of the past year that QuickBooks had to be adjusted because it was showing old accounts and charges that were no longer active. While this did not affect the bottom line, they showed up on the print out and raised questions that were answered and removed by the last committee review. As of our last review, all accounts are in good shape, all checks have cleared, and the balance is a true representation of monies available.

The proposed budget is the result of a lot of hard work to make sure it is in compliance with our code requiring a balanced budget. The Grand Secretary, the Grand Treasurer, the Finance Committee, the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, the Most Illustrious Grand Master, the Right Eminent Grand Commander, and the dais officers were consulted in the budget preparation. Great care and prayerful consideration was taken to make tough decisions of how to serve the York Rite Masons of Georgia. Declining membership and not enough new York Rite Masons coming in to the craft makes it difficult to offer the kind of services and programs that our members have come to expect. Good and dedicated leadership have come together to produce this year's budget.

We recommend that the investment accounts NOT be touched and that all future spending come from income only.

The Grand Commander was created a Knight Templar in Griffin Commandery No. 35 in Griffin. He served as Eminent Commander in 2008-2009. He served as Recorder/Treasurer 2012-2015. He was made a Knight Crusader of the Cross on May 6, 2008 and serves as Knight Crusader of the West. He has conferred the Order of the Temple as Commander many times, creating hundreds of Knights Templar around the State. He served the Grand Commandery as 3rd Division Liaison Officer in 2009-2011. He served as State Chairman of the Knights Templar Eye Foundation and Mollie S. Moseley Eye Foundation Trust. He serves as Right Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of Georgia.

The Grand Commander serves the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States of America by serving as an Aide-de-Camp for the Grand Treasurer, Right Eminent Sir Knight Bobby Simmons. He serves on the Grand Master's Advisory Committee. In 2017 he was created a Knight Commander of the Temple by the Grand Encampment. He was one of the first graduates of the Grand Encampment's Leadership development course, graduating in 2014. In 2008, the Grand Commander was made a Companion Knight of Chattahoochee York Rite College No. 166. He later became a member of Middle Georgia York Rite College No. 201 and served as Preeminent Governor in 2019-2020. He received the rank and title of Knight of the York Cross of Honour from Georgia Priory No. 39 in 2009 and later served as Eminent Prior in 2014-2015. He became a member of Muscogee Conclave of the Red Cross of Constantine in 2010 and served as Puissant Sovereign in 2018. He was a Charter member of Oglethorpe Chapel No. 21 of the Commemorative Order of St. Thomas of Acon in 2011 and served as Eminent Prior in 2018-2019. Nationally he served the Grand Council of St. Thomas of Acon as Grand Secretary from 2017-2019. He is also an honorary member of General Sam Houston Chapel No. 32 of Texas. He became a member of Carl F. Lester Jr. Council No. 65 Knights Masons in 2013. He was honored by the Grand Council of Knights Masons of the United States of America by being awarded and commissioned as a Knight Commander of Zerubbabel, award No. 90 in 2018. He became a member of Georgia Council No. 304 of the Allied Masonic Degrees in 2014 and serves as Senior Deacon. He is a member of the Red Branch of Eri. He became a Knight Priest in Upper Room Tabernacle No. XLV Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests in 2016. He became a member of Georgia College Societas Rosicruciana in Civitatibus Foederatis in 2017 and serves as Herald.

The Grand Commander has been instrumental in Chartering Invitational Bodies in Georgia. He was the Charter Excellent Chief of Crowned Martyrs Council No. 120 Knights Masons in Macon in 2016. He serves as Treasurer. He became the Primus (Charter) Senior Warden of Georgia Court No. 124 of the Masonic Order of Athelstan in 2017 and served as Worshipful Master in 2018-2019 and serves as Immediate Past Master. He is the Deputy Master Mason designate for Stone Mountain Assemblage of the Worshipful Society of Free Masons, Rough Masons, Wallers, Slaters, Paviors, Plaisterers and Bricklayers also known as "the Operatives". The Assemblage is set to be constituted in 2020.

The Grand Commander became a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies of the Valley of Columbus in 2005. He later transferred to the Valley of Macon and served on numerous degree teams as well as the executive committee. He was Master of Kadosh in 2012. In 2013, he was invested with the rank and

decoration of Knight Commander of the Court of Honour. He is a member of the Scottish Rite Research Society.

Other memberships include the Sovereign Order of Knights Preceptors, the Royal Order of Scotland, the Royal Order of Masonic Knights of the Scarlet Cord, the Order of the Sword of Bunker Hill becoming a charter member of James Jackson Camp No. 127, the Grand College of Rites of the USA, the Masonic Society, the Grand Worthy Chief's Council of the Universal Craftsman Council of Engineers, the Royal Order of Zanzibar, the Masonic Order of the Bath, the Order of the Four Black Llamas and the Yaraab Shrine Temple.

STATE OF THE ORDER

I am pleased to report that our Order is generally strong. We were certainly met with unique challenges this past year. I praise our Lord for his blessings on myself, on our Grand Commandery and each of you. I offer a special thank you to Sir Knight Mark Johnson, Very Eminent Deputy Grand Commander for all you have done this past year. I could not have asked for a better Deputy Grand Commander.

I believe we are at the start of a brighter future for our great Templar Order in Georgia. Our membership numbers look better than they have in many years, even decades. Many of our Commanderies have increased their membership in this last year. I am seeing new faces in most of our Commanderies with many of them being excited about Templary.

Membership has been identified as the most important priority for our Grand Master in this 68th Triennium. I made it my top priority as we all should. To that end I established two awards this year. The Golden Spur Award; given to the Commandery with the best net increase in membership and the Sir Knight Award; a shoulder cord recognition program for being the first line signer on petitions for the Orders or for restoration. I am pleased that these awards have been well received across our state.

We must continue to Recruit, Retain and Reinstate as we move forward. We must welcome new Sir Knights by encouraging them to be involved. He was one of the kindest Christian men I know and I am thankful that I was able to follow him in the Grand Commandery line. The loss of each of these Masonic giants will be felt for years to come. Their memories will live on with each of us.

APPOINTED OFFICERS

I extend my thanks to Sir Knights - Franklin Holland, Grand Sentinel; James Huffman, Grand Captain of the Guard; James Dutton, Grand Orator; and James Tate, Grand Adjutant; for all they have done for me this year. Each of these great Sir Knights supported me in their own special way.

I could not have served this year without the assistance and support each of you rendered to me. I will be eternally grateful to each of you for that and most especially for your friendship. I conferred with many Sir Knights, including the Grand Officers, Past Grand Commanders, the Southeast Department Commander Right Eminent Sir Knight James McGee and the Most Eminent Grand Master Jeffrey Nelson. I studied our Grand Commandery Code and the Grand Encampment Constitution extensively before making this decision. Using section 39 of the Grand Encampment Constitution I used my power and authority as Grand Commander to declare Ft. Benning Commandery No. 73 as legitimate. This decision is subject to confirmation or rejection at this Grand Conclave. I did not feel that it was within the purview of any one Sir Knight to make the final decision. By giving my order in this manner it places the decision within the hands of the Sir Knights of this Grand Commandery for your vote.

INSPECTIONS

The hospitality extended to myself and the Grand Commandery Officers this year has been outstanding. Several of our Commanderies are growing and it shows during their Inspections. The Commanderies dedication to the work is to be commended. It takes practice and it was evident that effort had been put in. I encourage every Commandery to continue to work harder as we can all do better no matter how good we are. This year I issued General Order No. 3 that stated we would have a Division Inspection in the First Division. I selected Bethlehem Commandery No. 30 at Thomasville to be the host Commandery. A special thank you is extended to them for hosting the Division Inspection. By bringing all of the Commanderies together at the same location we had more Sir Knights in attendance and better fellowship. Each Commandery was able to assist the other when positions needed to be filled. I believe that the Division Inspection was a success and thank everyone for their efforts.

(4) To promote programs of involvement that will enhance Templary.

GRAND LIAISON OFFICERS

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED: That Grand Liaison Officers are appointed by the Right Eminent Grand Commander. The Grand Liaison Officers will report to and represent the Grand Commander and or the Division Commander while on official business and will be afforded the respect and honors due a Grand Commandery Officer. Each Grand Liaison Officer will make one Official Visit to their Respective Commanderies in the Templar Year, Attend the Annual Inspection of their Respective Commanderies and Attend the Grand Commandery Conclave. The Grand Liaison Officers shall wear a red and green shoulder cord as recognition of their office.

INSPECTIONS

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED: That all Commanderies shall be inspected by March 1, 2021.

The Eminent Commander shall assemble the Sir Knights of his Commandery, on the assigned Inspection Date, for the purpose of holding their Annual Inspection. The Inspection shall be held in accordance with the Tactics and Customs of this Grand Jurisdiction. The Eminent Commander shall see that each Sir Knight, in the line, is in full uniform in accordance with the Grand Commandery Code and the Grand Encampment Constitution. The uniform symbolizes us as the Christian Soldiers within the Masonic Fraternity and we should each take personal pride in wearing it as a statement of who we are and what we represent.

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED: That the Recorder will furnish the Grand Inspecting Officer such information that will enable him to answer all questions on the Inspection Form. The completed Inspection Form will be forwarded to the Office of the Grand Recorder within ten (10) days after the Inspection by the Grand Inspecting Officer. All Grand Inspecting Officers MUST use the current Inspection Report form. All outdated Inspection Report forms will be rejected.

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED: That as per the Grand Commandery Constitution, Statutes, and Regulations that the Treasurer and Recorder of each Constituent Commandery will be bonded, unless the Commandery By-laws require more than one signature on a voucher or check before any monies are disbursed. The Grand Inspecting Officer will verify if either method is in order.

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED: That written proof of the last audit, showing date audited and a copy of tax form 990 will be provided to the Grand Inspecting Officer.

CHARITIES

It is my hope and prayer that each Sir Knight, within this Grand Jurisdiction, shall continue to contribute to our charities as liberally as his ability permits. Let us continue our efforts to support the Grand Encampment's Knight Templar Eye Foundation Inc., the Molly S. Moseley Eye Foundation Trust of Georgia, Inc. and the Knights Templar Holy Land Pilgrimage. I would like for every Commandery in Georgia to work toward the goal of sending a minister to the Holy Land. I know it is difficult for some Commanderies to accomplish this feat alone. I therefore encourage each Commandery that cannot individually sponsor a Minister to join with another Commandery(s) and jointly send a minister to the Holy Land. I would like for our Grand Commandery to send a total of 10 ministers to the Holy Land in 2021

FUNDRAISERS

I encourage every Commandery to hold at least one fundraiser per year to support the Commanderies programs and the charitable efforts of the Grand Commandery. Please support as many fundraisers as you can, either monetarily or by spending time participating in these worthwhile projects.

MOST ILLUSTRIOUS GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

To the Companions of Georgia, Grand Council Officers, Past Illustrious Grand Masters, and friends let me begin by thanking you for allowing me to serve as your Illustrious Grand Master for the past year. It has been the highlight of my Masonic career. I am forever grateful for the confidence shown in granting me this honor.

VISITATIONS

During my tenure of office I travelled to many Council meetings and Conventions. As we all know, in March, Masonic schedules were interrupted with the outbreak of coronavirus/Covid-19. Many of the Conventions that were scheduled to occur were put on hold (and at the time of my writing, have not been rescheduled). During the visitations that I was able to make perhaps the most memorable for me was establishing a new Council (under dispensation) in Jesup. To the Councils that invited me for visits this year, thank you for the hospitality you extended to me and my traveling Companions. During my visits it amazed me how many Companions I had met and befriended along this seven year journey.

During the year, I had the privilege of presenting many Time of Service awards to Companions who had reached the 25, 50, and 60 year marks in their respective Councils. I also was honored to inspect St. Elmo Commandery #21 in Brunswick. Other meetings I attended include: the Grand Assembly of the Order of the Rainbow Girls, the Grand Conclave of the Order of the DeMolay, the Grand Lodge of Georgia, Statewide AMD Council, as well as local meetings for Knight Masons, Red Cross of Constantine, Allied Masonic Degrees, York Rite College, and KYCH, and festivals, in addition to Blue Lodge visits and Scottish Rite meetings and the KCCH Investiture as well. Many of these visitations were with MEGHP Jim Tate and/or REGC Brandon Yarbrough in attendance as well.

NECROLOGY

During this Grand York Rite year 138 Companions have had the hand of the Death Angel laid upon them, including Past Most Illustrious Grand Masters Joe Suttles and John Bohanan (both passing on September 11, 2019). These Masonic giants leave holes in our fraternity as well as in the hearts of friends and loved ones. May the Supreme Grand Master provide peace and strength to the families of those who have laid down their working tools. And may we continue to labor in their absence until we meet again in that land of refreshment, wages, and rest.

DISPENSATIONS

Several dispensations were requested this year, most being routine in nature, they were granted and are on file in the Grand Recorders Office. Separate from the regular requests received annually was the request to form a new Council by Companion Jim Arnold and Jesup Council UD, this was also granted and the Council was constituted in December.

PERPETUAL MEMBERSHIP

The Grand Council needs more participation in the Perpetual Membership program. This needs to become heavily pushed by the Grand Officers, District Deputies, and by every Companion in this state. This is a method to lighten the load of annual dues and provide a lasting benefit to Council well after we have all passed. It is especially beneficial to new or young members—but by no means limited to them.

FUNDRAISERS

We did not hold a direct fundraiser this year, however we did receive the benefit of 52 week gun raffle started before this Grand York Rite year began. A caution however, we should not be using fundraisers to pay operating expenses. Fundraisers should go to benefit charitable causes like the CMMRF.

STATE OF THE CRAFT

Through my travels during the year, it is obvious that several places have strong and thriving Councils. Unfortunately, some continue to struggle to have enough to open, even on the Royal Master degree. In these places, I urge you to consider to do joint meetings such as is being held by Euclid and Alpharetta Councils or merge into another Council rather than close due to no attendance. I encourage all Councils that can, to focus on learning to confer at least 1 of the 2 degrees in the Councils and confer it at least once per year. Both are relatively short and don't require large degree teams.

APPOINTMENTS

It was my honor and privilege to appoint the following Grand Council Officers: Illustrious Companions: Jim House—Grand Chaplain, Alessandro Silva—Grand Sentinel, Robert Tidwell—Grand Photographer, Phillip Faulkner—Grand Organist, and Daniel Bennett—Grand Orator (the first Orator for the Grand Council of Georgia). Companions, you all are special to me and I appreciate everything you have done, not only for me, but for Cryptic Masonry, and Georgia York Rite as a whole. While we weren't always together this year, your presence was always appreciated and served as a reminder of the unity in our purpose and as a refreshment of the bonds of friendship shared among us. To the Companions that served as District Deputies, Committeemen, and in other leadership roles, thank you for accepting your appointments and fulfilling the duties of your respective positions in a manner that represents this Grand Council at its best. It is impossible to recognize everyone, so I will extend a general thank you.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Companions, in the coming years, a tough decision will be faced regarding the state of our Grand Council's finances. Compared to the Grand Chapter and the

Grand Commandery, the Grand Council has extremely little savings. It might become necessary at some point to raise per capita or have a special assessment. First, this is not out of waste or negligence of the Grand York Rite office, and in no way reflects mismanagement. The Grand Recorder and Grand Treasurer have combed the budget for savings or additional sources of income, but the problem remains—one of simple math—expenses continue to increase and revenues continue to decrease.

Secondly, I encourage every Companion in Georgia to work toward earning a "Purple Card" or Ritual Card. This was started this year with assistance from Right Excellent Companion Mike Sampsell and Most Illustrious Companion Larry Bennett. Our ritual is beautiful, but unfortunately often gets cut for time or convenience during our meetings. We have a book to help with learning—and knowing that all of us at one time learned a catechism—I know all are capable of learning it, if properly motivated.

One final recommendation: as I am writing this, the state of Georgia is in the midst of a shelter in place order due to Covid-19. Looking at my Facebook feed, it amazes me how many Companions are "starved" to get back to meetings. If this hunger for fraternity can be harnessed and directed properly, local Councils should be able to see a boom in membership and attendance in the coming months. Illustrious Masters be ready to quench that thirst and have meetings with meat.

I want to start by thanking the Companions I had the privilege to serve behind and learn from: Drew Lane, Charles Taylor, Floyd Edmondson, Ben Polston, John Haggas, and Larry Bennett—thank all of you for the example you set and the impact each of you made on me during my time in your line. When I am involved with something, my goal is always to leave it in better shape than I found it—and I challenge each of you to that same goal. Two big special "thank you's" go to Wade Smith and Mark Bradley—your dedication to Masonry is commendable but mostly your words of counsel and advice over the years have been invaluable. I will tell on myself-when Mark told us he was running for Grand Secretary/Recorder, I told him I didn't think he was the best person for the job, just the best we could afford. Mark—thank you for proving me wrong, you were absolutely the right person for this position at this time and place.

Our responsibility is to conduct the compilation in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The objective of a compilation is to assist management in presenting financial information in the form of financial statements without undertaking to obtain or provide any

assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the financial statements. Generally accepted accounting principles requires that marketable securities be reported at fair market value. Management is reporting the Organization's marketable securities at historical cost as determined by the original purchase price of the security. The effect of this departure from generally accepted accounting principles has not been determined. Management has elected to omit substantially all of the disclosures and the consolidated statement of cash flows required by generally accepted accounting principles. If the omitted disclosures and consolidated statement of cash flows were included in the financial statements, they might influence the user's conclusions about the Organization's financial position, changes in net assets and cash flows. Accordingly, these financial statements are not designed for those who are not informed about such matters.

**NOTE: An identical letter was submitted to this office for the Building Maintenance Fund, Grand Council, Grand Commandery, KTEF, Inc., and The Mollie S. Moseley Trust, Inc. The KTEF, Division Financials are submitted to Grand Encampment each year and they account to the IRS for those funds.
